WITNESSES TO THE

An amazing thing happened in March. Churches were closed but more people came to church. Millions of us were complying with shelter-in-place and physical distancing recommendations from the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC), and state and local officials to stop the spread of the coronavirus. In a matter of days our lives were completely disrupted. The places where we sheltered became our offices, classrooms, day care centers and recreational facilities. Traffic dissipated—I was tempted to leave my house and drive unimpeded up and down the Kennedy Expressway just because it was possible.

Measures to slow the spread of the disease work against in-person gatherings. Coming together for worship wasn't possible. Maintaining 6 feet of distance between people, refraining from touching and wearing face masks aren't conducive to corporate worship. I was in a CDC briefing that pointed out that singing was right up there with sneezing and

coughing in spreading the virus. Conventional all-together-in-the-building church was out.

So, what did we do? We found new ways of receiving the word and singing praise to God. All across this church, pastors and deacons, musicians and lay leaders created imaginative and fresh ways to worship. Virtual church, recorded church, livestreamed church happened everywhere. In parts of the country without sufficient Wi-Fi, congregations phoned each other, some on landlines. Pastors and deacons kept in contact with the people, and parishioners called each other. Worship resources to be used at home were shared. We might have been physically distanced, but we were not spiritually or socially isolated.

Many congregations and worship sites reported that online attendance was up and, in some cases, exceeded average Sunday in-person participation. People "attended" several services in a day. And we know that many attending online would never walk

into one of our churches.

The problem comes when people confuse the sacred space with the Sacred.

Now, before we get too excited about this new evangelism tool, we need to consider factors that may have contributed to increased attendance—no sports, no Starbucks, limited travel, convenience. This won't last forever. But the restrictions imposed by the pandemic have made it clear that people are searching for hope and meaning and love. The gospel, the good news, the reality of God's unconditional love "poured into our hearts through the Holy Spirit that has been given to us" (Romans 5:5), is the message that people long to hear. It is life for the dying, water for the parched, food for the starving, liberty for the oppressed. God has entrusted this word, this evangelical word, to the church and has commissioned us to tell it.

People wonder what the post-COVID world and the post-COVID church will look like. No one, except God, knows for certain. Our experience with worshiping remotely has taught us at least two things: the word of God expressed in worship, lament and praise is not irrelevant. And people who find our congregations—the building and people—intimidating or off-putting also long to be part of a community that witnesses to the life we have in Jesus.

I am praying for the day when we gather again. I miss going to church. Church, including the buildings, are sacred spaces. Human beings are drawn to places where they have experienced the holy. Congregations—buildings and people—are witnesses to the transcendent.

The problem comes when people confuse the sacred space with the Sacred. We must take care that our congregations don't become idols. Since we have concrete evidence that people who long to hear about the life, hope and grace that comes to the world through Jesus won't come into our churches, we need to go to them. We have done this in creative ways and through online worship during the pandemic. Don't stop. When we are able to return to our sacred spaces, let's make an honest assessment of the ways that our congregations are witnesses to the transcendent, places where we are

nourished for the journey and then sent out to serve. Or have they become barriers to those seeking the love and freedom God has given to all people in Christ?

HEALTHY COMMUNICATION IN TOUGH TIMES

Healthy communication is important in the best of times. Throw in a pandemic and political turmoil and things can get messy. In the church we are especially careful to express our love for each other and for all our neighbors by practicing healthy communication skills. Some basics that are helpful in all relationships include the following.

- Everyone speaks for themselves. Each of us needs to take responsibility for expressing our own feelings or concerns.
- When there is a concern, we go directly to the person involved. Honest, direct, loving communication is the basis of all healthy relationships.
- If the concern is not resolved after direct communication, we ask a neutral person to join us in that conversation for the sake of understanding and healing.
- We avoid triangulation. Triangulation occurs when one person does not communicate directly with another person, instead using a third person to relay communication to the second. Triangulation distorts relationships and makes clear communication difficult.
- We pray for each other trusting that God loves us all and in prayer can heal our hurts and restore relationships.

COUNCIL MEETING CHANGES

As we continue to adapt to a changing world, your church council has found new ways to meet and continue its' work, concisely stated as: ensuring that "the purpose of the church is fulfilled (Love God and Love Neighbor) and managing the property and finances of the congregation so that purpose #1 can be fulfilled."

We have found Zoom meetings to be useful but exhausting and challenging. So, we divided the work of council into two parts: Mission and Administration. The first council meeting each month, on the second Tuesday we focus on the mission of the church., hearing reports from ministry leaders and addressing mission needs. The second council meeting each month, on the fourth Tuesday focuses on administrative responsibilities, including financial, hearing reports from the treasurer and financial secretary. Each meeting is scheduled to last one hour. We do our best to stay within that hour, honoring the reality of the stress and exhaustion many of us are feeling during this time.

In addition to those changes we do as much of the work ahead of time as possible, communicating via email, submitting reports far in advance so there is time for questions to be answered before we meet.

As has always been the case, congregation members are invited to join council meetings. If you have an agenda item you want included at the meeting or if you would like to sit in on a meeting, send those requests to council president, Joelle Buckman. She can be reached at: joelle_buckman@email.com or 360.589.6111. Please submit those requests far enough in advance that she can determine at which meeting they would be most appropriate.

Zoom meetings require a link which must be kept secure to avoid being "zoom bombed." (I know! For every new technology there a new way to make things difficult. Zoom bombing is when unwanted people join the meeting sometimes flooding it with inappropriate or disturbing photos or video.) Joelle will provide you with that link so you can join the meeting. There will be time at the end for you to comment if you wish to do that. Council members are always available to answer questions. Their contact information is at the end of this newsletter.

Please pray for your church leadership, including Pastor Val. These times are challenging for all of us. The leadership of the church feels that challenge personally as well as the need to faithfully listen to God's Spirit leading the church into an unknown future.

 - 1. Resuming in-person worship Task Force- report
 - -Task force will be meeting weekly. Val has contacted the Governor and the Synod about what Phase 3 requirements are. Task force proposal and all supporting information will be sent to the congregation. M/S/P.

B. Outreach- Amy Ostwald

- 1. Porta-Potty Ministry-Pastor Val and Curtis
 - -Pastor Val and Curtis are keeping an eye on the area around the porta potties. Pastor Val has been in contact with Sarah who says it has been a great service to the community. We based the decision to make these available on our values and mission and that continues to guide us.
- 2. Family Promise
 - -Charles is currently planning on not opening for regular service until the church has in-person worship. Charles will give Pastor Val a couple of weeks' notice about Family Promise's plans, so Pastor Val can let Sarah know (porta-potties will be removed at this time).
- 3. Love our Neighbor Fund
 - -CCAP is overwhelmed right now with work. Waiting for the go ahead from CCAP. Pastor Val and other Pastors are looking at other options.
- 4. Chaplains dinner
 - -Great success. It was appreciated. Looking forward to doing it again.
- C. PSALM report- Joelle and Pastor Val
 - -All 5 participants are wrapping up the two years of the program. More to follow with what they have learned and how they will use that in the congregation. No new applications for the next class yet.
- D. Youth and Family-Curtis Steinhauer
 - 1. Confirmation-Pastor Val
 - -Continues to meet ½ hour each week.
 - 2. Adult group study- Manna and Mercy
- E. <u>Fellowship</u>- Judi
 - -91 dinners that the 4-F crew is serving tomorrow.
 - -Kristine and Judi delivered some newsletters last month; they will continue to do that for as long as need.
- F. Property- Mike
 - 1. Sunday School room
 - -There are 3 colors of paint on the wall to decide which one to use.
 - What should our next project be after roof is funded?
 - -Mike has plans to repair the stained-glass windows in the church. The last estimate for a section of the windows was around \$130,000. Can do it in smaller sections. Mike has been in contact with several people for more bids but has not heard back.
 - Pastor Val proposed that one project could be upgrading audio and video capabilities so that we are well prepared to continue online worship even when we resume in-person worship.
 - All proposals for the next phase of fundraising is invited to submit a proposal to council.
 - Let our mission and values be our guide to our property expenditures as they are for everything in the church.
 - 2. Dumpster
 - -Mike described a problem that has arisen with people getting trash out of our dumpster. There are several options to lock it. It was decided that we would monitor the situation and revisit it later.
 - 3. Property Manager responsibilities
 - -The property manager needs to inform the council of all new maintenance projects. Normal repairs such as painting after repairs, replacement of in-kind materials, and other standard maintenance/wear and tear projects do not need council approval. However these repairs should be noted and be part of the property managers report.
 - Council approval is required for all projects that exceed a \$ 750.00 estimate.
 - Emergency repairs can begin at the discretion of the property manager.
