We're past the halfway point in the season of Lent this year. Good time for a mid-course assessment of where we've been and how we're doing. As with most things I'm having a mixed experience: more prayer but less fasting than I'd hoped. (That only shows my temperament that finds it easier to add to a habit rather than refrain from one.) I'm committed to 'giving away' 40 things, one-aday, during Lent in an effort to simplify and remind myself that consumption has a cost not only to me but to our overburdened planet. But, at this point, more than 20 days in, I'm only at about 8 things stashed in my give away box. I have some catching up to do. I'm reading more scripture as part of my Lenten devotions but I'm not sure it's touching me as deeply as less quantity but more focused reading might. I'm finding ways to give more money to those who truly need help but find myself short of time to give of myself. As I said, it's a mixed bag.

Maybe you're having a similar experience. Or maybe you find that at this point your good intentions are simply that. Time has slipped away and you've barely given any Lenten habits of the heart a

second thought. (Raise your hand if you have perfectly accomplished every habit that you thought might open your heart more to God this Lenten season!!! That's what I thought. I don't see one raised hand. ②)

I'm counting on one of my favorite writers on all things spiritual to help us understand our predicament, for good and for bad.

Richard Rohr's Daily Meditation - Interior Poverty

"When you're trapped inside a social system where you constantly have to work for your own superiority and can slip into inferiority in a moment, [think: downsizing of a job; debilitating illness; unfaithful spouse, or even disappointment in ourselves; it could be anything that reveals our lack of control] you are inevitably very insecure. You cannot draw your life from your own center or from an outer reliable Source.

As a Christian, I know that my true value is something that God gives me freely. You are inherently, objectively, totally, and forever a daughter or son of God. You cannot gain that or lose that by any achievement or failure

whatsoever. God doesn't participate in the honor/shame system. Christianity's role is always to tell you that you are **objectively** a child of God! **Our primary job is to keep proclaiming the true identity of things, and not to create contests whereby some few can attain their identity—if they are good enough.**

But much of religion has bought right back into the honor/shame system. All we did was change the cultural rules to religious rules. Now there was yet another way to be superior—by being pious, publicly religious, and "moral" about one or two things which are usually not central issues. Yet Jesus' teachings against status-seeking and building up religious reputation tell us again and again, "Don't go there!" (check out Matthew 6:1-21 and Luke 18:9-14.)

Part of an article I quoted in last month's message was this: [Lent is about] "asking how beauty might occur in the midst of our fragile, decaying lives. It's about creating new songs, stories, images scribbled in dust and ash that reexamine what human beings can be for the life of each other and the life of the planet."

Rather than evaluating "how I'm doing" based on how perfectly I've followed my chosen Lenten habits, which only contributes to making faith part of the destructive honor/shame system, it might be more useful to ask if those habits are helping me see beauty in decay? Have they helped me create new songs, stories and images in the ash for the sake of our life together and the life of the planet? Have our habits of the heart helped us to create and imagine together?


My answer **for myself** would have to be mostly no. Beauty and creativity only thrive

in an atmosphere of openness and hope and possibility; the opposite of the discouragement that can set in when our expectations of ourselves are unmet.

With almost 3 weeks left until Easter, I think I'll shift gears and invite you to make a shift as well. I give myself permission to read **only one** passage from the Bible for purely devotional purposes. I give myself permission to give away 40 things but it may take me an extra month past Easter to get that done. I give myself permission to try again at fasting, realizing that any habit that opens my heart to God is worth beginning any day and every day. I'm going to continue to look for ways to give money to those who need it. But, I'll also limit the number of "extra" commitments I will take on in this time, knowing that the quality of time I am able to give to others is dependent upon knowing my limitations.

And I think these words will be my guide in the coming weeks: "You are precious in my eyes, you are honored, and I love you. (Isaiah 43:4). I need to hear that again and again to remember that I already have everything I need in Christ; that I am "objectively a child of God." I encourage you to live this last half of Lent practicing habits of the heart that shape you in this truth:

YOU ARE A CHILD OF GOD, PRECIOUS IN GOD'S EYES, HONORED AND LOVED!

All Holy Week services are appropriate for children since they best learn to appreciate and understand the faith by experiencing worship with the whole faith community.

SUNDAY, APRIL 13, 10:00 a.m. PALM SUNDAY

Palm Sunday marks the beginning of Holy Week, the last week of Jesus' life on earth. What began with shouts of joy and honor, soon turns to betrayal and death.

THURSDAY. APRIL 17, 7:00 p.m. MAUNDY THURSDAY

On Maundy Thursday, the church participates in one of the constants of human life: marking significant occasions with a meal. The Bible tells many stories of Jesus eating with people considered inappropriate meal companions. In the last supper before his death Jesus established this simple meal of bread and wine as a permanent sign of the covenant between God and the people. The meal made present Christ's death and resurrection

making the community that shares it into the body of Christ.

On Maundy (from the Latin mandatum meaning command) Thursday we hear the command to love and serve one another. **We will include** handwashing as a sign of serving one another. This is a prayerful act. The one washing hands prays for you while washing your hands.

Maundy Thursday worship is especially appropriate for young people and will include presentation of first Bibles to those in 3rd grade and older who have not received a Bible from the congregation. They will receive their own Bible within the context of the service which is already deeply meaningful to children. Please let Susan or Pastor Val know if your child will be receiving a Bible so that we can order them IN TIME FOR THIS SERVICE.

FRIDAY, APRIL 18, 7:00 p.m.



We call a statement a paradox when it appears to be false, but is shown finally to be true. We think that a thing is wrong, but by the end we discover that it is right. An example of paradox is the Christian observance of Good Friday. One would think that the day commemorating the execution of a messiah would be kept in unmitigated mourning. Over the centuries some Christian communities have dedicated this day to dismal rituals of lament. The restored Holy Week rites ask us to keep this good day in a paradoxical way. Our worship is marked not by excessive sorrow, as if we are pretending that Christ is still dead, but rather by solemn devotion. For even on this day we assemble as people of the resurrection. We wait and meditate on the meaning of Christ's cross and we pray.



Amazing Grace Lutheran Church Council Meeting Minutes March 4, 2014

- I. The Amazing Grace Lutheran Church council meeting was called to order at 6:30pm by President Mark Smalley.
- II. Opening devotions were read by Pastor Val, as provided by Jeannette Green who was unfortunately home ill.
- III. Prayer tasks were assigned as follows: Thanksgiving/Dee, Intercession/Mark, Petition/Pastor Val, Praise/Chris.
- IV. Mark noted that a quorum was established for this meeting.
- V. The Agenda was reviewed and m/s/a.
- VI. The minutes from the last meeting, February 4, 2014, were m/s/a. Mark reminded us that we need to "reply all" when Jeannette sends the minutes to us by e-mail.
- VII. Financial Reports:
 - Treasurer's Report Barb Williams
 Barb submitted bills for approval. M/s/a. Barb also submitted a list of items that need to be taken care of. She noted that Chrissie Kincaid and Mike Kupka will be meeting with her on Thursday, March 6th to review the treasurer's job details.
 - Financial Secretary's Report Mike Kupka.

 Mike submitted the February 2014 Income vs. Expenses breakdown. Questions were answered.

VIII. Business items:

- A. It was m/s/a to appoint two new council members to fill unexpired terms: Youth & Family/Chris Seelke and Treasurer/Chrissie Kincaid
- B. Council Retreat plans were discussed. Tentatively this will be held on Saturday, March 29th at the Galilean Retreat Center in Ocean Shores. We will meet at AGLC at 8:30 am to car pool. These plans are pending the availability of a wheelchair lift vehicle for transportation. If we are not able to procure a vehicle, we will hold our Retreat at AGLC, from 9:00 am to 3:00 pm. A potluck luncheon will be provided by council members (watch your e-mail). The agenda will include the sharing of our faith stories and also council training based on "Blueprint for Change, a manual for the 21st Century Council". Mark will e-mail out the reading assignments.
- C. Church Mutual Pastor Val and Coleman Carle talked about the recent report from Church Mutual. The report included:
 - 1. Sidewalks need to be fixed
 - 2. Exit signs need to be placed over doors
 - 3. Need sprinkler system
 - 4. Need burglar alarm
 - 5. Need CO2 monitor
 - 6. Bars on windows

A group will be formed to deal with the Church Mutual issues.

- D. Priority List Coleman will obtain information/quotes about the following:
 - 1. Electrical quotes for the Organ Room
 - 2. Lighting for the Organ Room
 - 3. Skywalk leak
 - 4. Breezeway (by office) leak by the chimney

It was m/s/a to allow the Youth Center to spend up to \$1000 to fix the ceiling in the Youth Center.

- E. Gift Policy Pastor Val submitted examples of gift policies. She and Mark will work on drafting a Gift Policy.
- F. Electronic Giving -
- G. Policy for Emergency Cold Weather Shelter Pastor Val submitted an example of an Emergency Shelter policy. Pastor Val and Mark will work on drafting an Emergency Shelter policy. Pastor noted that she will be attending a meeting about emergency preparedness for Churches. Mark asked us to review and send our thought on "Use of Churches as Emergency Shelters".
- H. Youth Protection Policy Pastor Val and Chris, along with the rest of the Youth & Family committee will work on a Youth Protection Policy. Pastor noted that background checks are required for all who work with youth. Also we must always have two adults working together with any activity; never one on one.
- I. Policy Manual A discussion was held concerning the need for an updated policy manual. Mark will ask Gene Schermer if he would be willing to head up this project.

IX. Ministry Reports

A. Property – Coleman Carle

Coleman submitted a written report from the Property Committee outlining the projects for this year, along with future projects. He noted that this property report will be in the next newsletter. Mark asked Coleman to get quotes on the top ten projects in the next two months, and quotes on all projects within the next six months.

B. Fellowship – Dee Erickson

Dee noted that four women were able to attend the February 7-10 Holden Village Women's Retreat. She reported that several volunteers have signed up to provide soup and bread for the upcoming Thursday evening Lenten Services. Dee reported that a St. Patrick's Day dinner will be held on Sunday, March 16th. Finally, she noted that a Fellowship Committee is in the works. Four church members have expressed interest in the Committee and she will be talking to several others about specific activities including the possibility of future dinners and the creating of a knitting group.

- C. Outreach Kristine Finazzo
 - Kristine reported that she will be holding an Outreach Committee meeting after Coffee hour on March 16th where she would like to include everyone who is interested in discussing "local to global" needs.
- D. Stewardship No report.
- E. Youth & Family the Church Council welcomed Chris Seelke as the Youth & Family representative and thanked him for his willingness to serve.
- F. Worship Diane Hanson

Diane noted that the LAT continues to meet around Lent/Easter. The date for the next Worship Committee meeting will be announced. The committee is using the text "Worship in Word & Sacrament".

X. Pastor's Report - Pastor Val Metropolous

Pastor submitted a written report (see attached) and also noted that Sarah Monroe will be preaching on March 30th. Pastor also discussed the need for a policy regarding performing same-sex marriages. The Council is encouraged to talk to the congregation and a vote will be taken of the Council in May regarding this topic.

- XI. Task Assignments -
 - Diane Devotions for April
 - Diane Will contact Pastor Beth about if a structural analysis was ever done.
