Give Thanks with a Grateful Heart



You may remember the song, Give Thanks With a Grateful Heart:

"Give thanks with a grateful heart Give thanks to the Holy One Give thanks because He's given Jesus Christ, His Son

And now let the weak say, "I am strong." Let the poor say, "I am rich Because of what the Lord has done for us. Give thanks."

What you may not know is that "Give Thanks" was written by Henry Smith and that it was his only published worship song. He composed 300 other songs that were **never** published. Smith wrote it after graduating from college and having trouble finding work. Not, only that, he also suffered from a degenerative condition that eventually left him legally

blind.

That story reminds me of the Apostle Paul, who while imprisoned in a Roman jail wrote this, "Rejoice in the Lord always; again I will say, Rejoice."

I need these reminders of people who in all the important ways were just like me, and you, who were able to give thanks and rejoice in the midst of their adversity and suffering!

Our struggles, our sadness, and confusion and fear are real. It doesn't do anyone any good to deny that there are valid reasons for feeling that way in the middle of a triple pandemic of disease, political upheaval and racism. But, people of faith have throughout history reoriented themselves around what is truly important, trusting that God is still God and God is with us bending that long arc of

the moral universe bends toward justice and that we are held in God's heart now and forever.

How we hold on to that truth is also given to us from the departed saints of the faith:

- 1. Let your gentleness be known to everyone. The Lord is near.
- 2. Do not worry about anything, but in everything by prayer and supplication with thanksgiving let your requests be made known to God.
- 3. Finally, beloved, whatever is true, whatever is honorable, whatever is just, whatever is pure, whatever is pleasing, whatever is commendable, if there is any excellence and if there is anything worthy of praise, think about these things.

And the result will be that: "The peace of God, which surpasses all understanding, will guard your hearts and your minds in Christ Jesus." Philippians 4: 4-8

This isn't to say it's easy. It isn't to say we should cover our ears and like the child trying to drown out the unwelcome truth loudly shouting, "La, la, la, la." There truly are events happening in our world that

need our attention, our prayer and our engagement. But they are not ultimately what determine our joy or our peace. They are the focus of the work we are given by God to bring God's peace and joy to ALL people. But they cannot destroy that peace or that joy. That is protected deep in the heart of God where we reside now and forever.

In that spirit of trust, I offer this prayer from the Corrymeela community of Ireland:

God of the dust to which we return, God of the ash that enriches the soil:

there are seeds from trees

that open

only after a fire has passed through. They push the tips of their roots down when the sunlight above has space.

May we remember

that after all we see passes away, the gifts you promise remain.

Faith. Hope. Love.

And the greatest of these is taking root now in the soil of compassion.

in the soil of compassion and kindness. Amen.

Jesus and the election

I think this is almost invariably (note the tiny escape clause) an accurate statement: *Lutheran pastors do not tell parishioners how to vote*. Not only is this technically illegal but also probably unwise. I can't recall who said, "Overtly partisan sermons only reveal which newspapers arrive each week at the parsonage."

All political candidates are flawed—some more flamboyantly than others. Allegiance to a political party and its candidates cannot be blindly synced with faithfulness to the kingdom of God.

Pastoral hesitation in touting "orthodox" voting has nothing to do with the oft-quoted (and usually misunderstood) phrase "separation of church and state." Our constitutional forebears weren't claiming that faith and politics should never mix. They were insisting that no particular religious expression could be imposed on the local citizenry.

Engagement with political leaders in shaping national and local policy is an **important facet of faithful discipleship.** "Seek the welfare of the city where I have sent you," God advises via Jeremiah (29:7)—surprising counsel offered to exiles living in a temporary setting.

If you think about it, we're all exiles, living in a temporary setting. Our true homeland and primary citizenship are elsewhere. Even so, Christians are instructed to pray "for kings and all who are in high positions, so that we may lead a quiet and peaceable life in all godliness and dignity" (1 Timothy 2:2).

The word "Lord," repeatedly assigned to Jesus in the New Testament, is unsettling and radically subversive. If Jesus is Lord of our lives, all earthly allegiances, including family, flag and fiduciary backup, take a back seat to our devotion to this man. Signing on with Jesus means we give the man practical priority in all the affairs of this life, the narrow gate, never easy. "The road is hard that leads to life" (Matthew 7:14).

In a clever aside to Jesus, my friend, theologian Will Willimon, writes: "At my advanced age, your frenetic pace is beginning to show on me. I long to locate, to bed down, settle in, and sit tight on what I already know of you rather than be forced to follow into some unknown destination. I find it remarkable that you have absolutely nothing to say about retirement."

Jesus plans to challenge his chosen (at any age) wherever we happen to be. Like it or not, this includes joining us this November in a voting booth as we privately ponder a slate of candidates and their core convictions.

People have told me that how they vote is entirely their own business. I get that, but don't be surprised if another voice whispers reminders of his advice, as Lord of heaven and earth, to disciples like me and vou:

Blessed are the poor (Luke 6:20). Love your enemies (Matthew 5:44). You cannot serve God and wealth (Matthew 6:24). *I was a stranger and you welcomed me* (Matthew

25:35).

Contrary to popular belief, Christians do not enter a voting booth alone.

Many Novembers ago, I was sitting in a pub with church friends and the topic turned toward the coming election. One close pal said, "You know, I love Jesus, but I'd never vote for him for president." I remember lots of laughter, including mine. I think I know what my friend meant by that, but I left the pub that night with an odd feeling, and it had nothing to do with the beer.

I sincerely doubt that Jesus would even want to be president of our country. His Lordship, for Christian starters, is global, concerned with many flags. But what I felt that night, in retrospect, was a rather dis-

missive shelving of Jesus in certain realms of our lives. If Jesus is not Lord of all, he may soon be Lord of very little.

FOOD BANK DROP-OFF

In order to help our Food Banks, please drop off food, diapers or other items at the parish hall at Amazing Grace.

TASK FORCE for resuming in-person worship has recommended that we continue worship on facebook live while also beginning to have a few people in the sanctuary in person. If you would like to attend worship ON SUNDAY, please contact the church office BEFORE NOON the Friday before (two day prior to worship.) The first 12 people will be contacted that they will be expected in worship. If you are not called or emailed, you were not among the first 12 people. All safety protocols will be enforced:

- 1. masks are mandatory (we'll have some available) and must remain the entre time including while sing-
- 2. seating only in designated areas,
- 3. maintaining at least 6 feet distance,
- 4. everyone MUST sign in so that contact tracing is possible if needed
- 5. Everyone will be dismissed to minimize contact and there will be no lingering in the sanctuary after worship

HEALTHY COMMUNICATION IN TOUGH TIMES

Healthy communication is important in the best of times. Throw in a pandemic and political turmoil and things can get messy. In the church we are especially careful to express our love for each other and for all our neighbors by practicing healthy communication skills. Some basics that are helpful in all relationships include the following.

- Everyone speaks for themselves. Each of us needs to take responsibility for expressing our own feelings or concerns.
- When there is a concern, we go directly to the person involved. Honest, direct, loving commu-

- nication is the basis of all healthy relationships.
- If the concern is not resolved after direct communication, we ask a neutral person to join us in that conversation for the sake of understanding and healing.
- We avoid triangulation. Triangulation occurs when one person does not communicate directly with another person, instead using a third person to relay communication to the second. Triangulation distorts relationships and makes clear communication difficult.
- We pray for each other trusting that God loves us all and in prayer can heal our hurts and restore relationships.

COUNCIL MEETING CHANGES

As we continue to adapt to a changing world, your church council has found new ways to meet and continue its' work, concisely stated as: ensuring that "the purpose of the church is fulfilled (Love God and Love Neighbor) and managing the property and finances of the congregation so that purpose #1 can be fulfilled."

We have found Zoom meetings to be useful but exhausting and challenging. So, we divided the work of council into two parts: Mission and Administration. The first council meeting each month, on the second Tuesday we focus on the mission of the church., hearing reports from ministry leaders and addressing mission needs. The second council meeting each month, on the fourth Tuesday focuses on administrative responsibilities, including financial, hearing reports from the treasurer and financial secretary. Each meeting is scheduled to last one hour. We do our best to stay within that hour, honoring the reality of the stress and exhaustion many of us are feeling during this time.

In addition to those changes we do as much of the work ahead of time as possible, communicating via email, submitting reports far in advance so there is time for questions to be answered before we meet.

As has always been the case, congregation members are invited to join council meetings. If you have an agenda item you want included at the meeting or if you would like to sit in on a meeting, send those requests to council president, Joelle Buckman. She can be reached at: joelle_buckman@email.com or 360.589.6111. Please submit those requests far enough in advance that she can determine at which meeting they would be most appropriate.

Zoom meetings require a link which must be kept secure to avoid being "zoom bombed." (I know! For every new technology there a new way to make things difficult. Zoom bombing is when unwanted people join the meeting sometimes flooding it with inappropriate or disturbing photos or video.) Joelle will provide you with that link so you can join the meeting. There will be time at the end for you to comment if you wish to do that. It is most appropriate to contact the council member that your question addresses outside of council meeting. They are always available to answer questions. Their contact information is at the end of this newsletter.

 - E. <u>Bel-Aire Property up-date</u>

At a special congregational meeting in June 2015 a decision was made to sell the property and disburse the money as follows: . 90% to the Endowment Committee and 10% goes somewhere else. If another option is to be offered it will require a congregational vote.

- A. Worship Dee Erickson and Pastor Val
 - -LAT Team: Have not met in person for a while. Pastor has been changing paraments. The LAT Team is in email discussions to virtually meet soon to plan for upcoming seasons.
 - 1. Resuming in-person worship Task Force report
 - -Task force has been discussing this issue for months. We have decided we need to consider the emotional and spiritual needs of the congregation. We will be very slowly welcoming small numbers each Sunday. The Facebook live services will continue to be conducted along with the small in-person gatherings each Sunday.
