The L'Arche Community was founded in France and now

has homes around the world. In L'Arche communities people with developmental disabilities and those who assist them live and work together to create homes. The L'Arche Charter says, "In a divided world, L'Arche wants to be a sign of hope. Its communities, founded on covenant relationships between people of differing intellectual capacity, social origin, religion and culture, seek to be signs of unity, faithfulness and reconciliation."

The following story was told by Henri Nouwen recalling an event that happened between L'arche community residents in France:

"Claude has the most illogical mind that I have ever encountered so this may be the first and last time that he is ever quoted in a book. He may ask such questions as 'What time is orange?' or 'How was tomorrow?' But still he does have a wisdom all his own... Well, one day Claude was at the beach with Jean-Pierre and several others of the community. The ocean was at low tide so there was an immense stretch of flat, sandy beach. They began making designs in the sand. Claude drew a big circle with a couple of marks inside that could have been facial features. 'What's that?' asked Jean-Pierre. With a big smile Claude replied: 'It's Madame Sun.' 'That's good' Jean-Pierre said, 'Now let's see you draw joy.' Claude took a look around him at the wide beach that stretched out in both directions as far as they eye could see, then he turned to Jean-Pierre and said with a huge smile but in all seriousness: 'There's not enough room!""

### Cry and Die


"To call a local church into the mission of Jesus is to call its members into two behaviors.

As of July 1<sup>st</sup> we're at the midway point in our 6 weeks of prayer and discernment. The Outreach ministry asked us to pray for God's guidance and wisdom so that the mission God is calling us to as a congregation would become clear.

The people of Amazing Grace are involved in God's work of redeeming the world in many ways already: as volunteers in the community, through activities in the congregation, and in our work life and relationships. We trust that God is always at work, bringing hope into desperate situations, good out of evil and passion out of complacency. We trust that God always goes ahead of us into every situation, every neighborhood, and every relationship, no matter how hopeless or unredeemable they may appear. Our prayer is that God will stir us to see with new eyes and open hearts what God is already doing here in Aberdeen, in Grays Harbor, Washington, the USA and around the world so that we can be a part of that work of bringing hope to this weary world.

There is always the danger as well-intentioned people with a world full of need in our face that we will just jump in, anxious to "do something." That understandable attitude leads us to ask God to bless **our plans** rather than waiting on God's time and

consenting to our hearts being shaped by prayer and study and discernment as a community of believers. Prayer, study and community discernment attune us to learn to hear the tune that God's invites us to sing along with and to give up the tired, discordant tunes that have proven so destructive in the past.

The Outreach ministry has asked us to be in prayer for six weeks, knowing that that may be only the beginning. The way forward may still not be clear at that time. But, we are committed as people who follow the one who told us not to "Get 'er done" but to "Take up your cross and follow me" or as The Message version of the Bible says it, "Anyone who intends to come with me has to let me lead. You're not in the driver's seat; I am. Don't run from suffering; embrace it. Follow me and I'll show you how. Self-help is no help at all. Self-sacrifice is the way, my way, to finding yourself, your true self. What kind of deal is it to get everything you want but lose yourself? What could you ever trade your soul for?" Matthew 16:24-26

Sacrifice and self-denial are not popular tunes in our world today. In fact, they have never been popular. But for those of us who follow Jesus of the cross it is the only way.

Please join the outreach ministry team in prayer for the next three weeks and maybe beyond. Open your heart to see and hear and feel what God may be nudging us to see and hear and feel in our neighborhood and throughout the world. Write down your thoughts so that you can share them when we come together to talk about this. Join your brothers and sisters in Christ here at Amazing Grace humbly asking for God's guidance so that we can faithfully be the face and hands of Jesus in this place at this time.

### MESSAGE FROM BISHOP JAECH

## Southwestern Washington Synod, Evangelical Lutheran Church in America.

"Do not neglect to show hospitality to strangers, for by doing that some have entertained angels without knowing it." Hebrews 13:2

We enjoyed a wonderful Synod Assembly in late May, reflecting on the theme of Hospitality and practicing hospitality with one another. Both our Assembly planning committee, chaired by Pastor Ron Kempe, and the entire congregation and staff of Trinity Lutheran Church, who hosted us, deserve our deep thanks for the constant hospitality they offered.

How do we practice hospitality in our life and ministry as congregations? Here's a brief summary of what we considered at the Assembly.

In the New Testament Gospels, we see two important types of hospitality being offered. When Martha and Mary welcome Jesus into their home in Bethany, they are giving a wonderful example of Home Hospitality. Home Hospitality is when we open our hearts, homes and congregations to all who enter, providing them a place to be welcomed and nourished by the Spirit of God through Word, Sacrament and Holy Community. Home Hospitality is essential to our work as the community of Christ's people.

Jesus also demonstrates another kind of hospitality, which can be called **Road Hospitality**. In his parable of the Good Samaritan, Jesus describes three ways that we treat each other when we meet on the highways of life. We do Road Rage, like the robbers who beat up the man who was on his way to Jericho. We do Road Avoidance, like the priest and Levite who "passed on the other side" in order to avoid getting

involved with the wounded man lying on the ground.

Or say Jesus, we can do **Road hospitality, like the Samaritan,** who went to extraordinary lengths to care for the injured man.

Both Home Hospitality and Road Hospitality are necessary parts of our ministry as Lutheran congregations in the Southwestern Washington Synod. First, they are the natural outgrowth of God's grace and love stirring in our lives. We are all travelers through life and God continually meets us on the road, wherever we are, and heals us, welcomes us home, and nourishes us as dear and beloved children.

Second, Home and Road Hospitality are crucial for our future existence as a church. Not as many people are coming through our doors on Sunday morning as they used to. Therefore, we need to go out these doors to find people wherever they are hurting and minister to them in Christ's name. We would do that in any case because it's the Way that Jesus leads us. We also do Road Hospitality because it's a key way to meet new people and form trusting relationships. It will lead people to say, "Who are these Lutherans who seem to care so much about us, our cities, and creation itself? Maybe I might like being part of their community?"

God bless you as you gather each week in your church homes to be fed, filled and renewed by God. God bless you as you go out on the roads each week to bring God's love to your neighbors. Through that interwoven pattern of Home and Road Hospitality, the Holy Spirit keeps us alive.

## **ELCA Ministries**

### Shout-out for Team ELCA

A call to all for greater, deeper and unapologetic participation in this church.

We are in the middle of synod assembly season. All synods will meet, vote, discuss, worship and sing. I will be at five of these and can assure you that, though there are delightful regional flavors, they will be remarkably similar. If we were to take a voting member from the Pacifica Synod meeting in Hawaii this year and plunk her down in the hills of Pennsylvania at the Allegheny Synod Assembly, she would recognize what was going on.

Each year from April to June a remarkable thing happens across this church. We come together. Members of synods participate together in the work of the ELCA and like it! Congregations see the work we do together as the ELCA all across this country and around the world and have a sense that they are part

of something greater than themselves and are proud of it. For a few shining days we believe and live the words of Paul: "So we, who are many, are one body in Christ, and individually we are members one of another" (Romans12:5).

And then we go home.

In the Dr. Seuss story *Horton Hears a Who!* there is an entire civilization existing on a speck of dust. The moral of this story is that, though it might not be part of our experience, we shouldn't discount the experience of another. After all, "a person's a person no matter how small." But I think there is another less perky lesson to be drawn, and that is, until they got into trouble the citizens of Whoville were quite content to believe their speck of dust was the whole world.

We're not so different. Congregations can, and often do, fall into the trap of believing that they are the church, the whole church, all by themselves. Coupled with some of the most frequently asked questions usually raised around budget time—"What do we get from the synod?" and "What does the synod do for us?"—this understanding of church becomes what I call "Transactional Whoville Ecclesiology." Transactional because the motivation for participating in a relationship is what can be gotten out of it. Whoville because the individual or the congregation or the synod or the region or the churchwide organization believes it is entirely the church.

I'm not sure which part of Transactional Whoville Ecclesiology is most distressing. This ecclesiology arises from a transactional understanding of our relationship with God. If I go to church, if I keep the commandments, if I follow Jesus, then God will do something for me. The gift of resurrection itself becomes a transaction. It's like someone saying to his or her spouse, "I love you honey, but I'm only in this marriage to get your pension when you die." It's the opposite of "We love because [God] first loved us" (1 John 4:19). It's "we love so God will love us." This is a grace-less ecclesiology.

The question should not be "What does the synod do for us?" or "What do we get from the synod?" Rather, transformed by the love of God in the death and resurrection of Christ, the question should be "What are we able to do together as synod?" or "What do we

get to do as synod or as the ELCA?"

Whoville ecclesiology is isolating. It's also really American. We celebrate the concept of the rugged individual. We value self-determination. Autonomy is prized. We are suspicious of claims on us by a greater whole. The concept of church as the body of Christ and that we are members one of another, then, is very countercultural.

But the baptized aren't just a collection of individuals in the church for what they can get out of it. We have been claimed by Christ. Paul reminds us, "You are not your own" (1 Corinthians 6:19). The Marine Corps has billboards that proclaim: "Serving something greater than themselves." How is it that they are better at articulating what it means to be church together than we are?

This isn't a plug for institutional survival or mindless loyalty. It's a call to each of us and all of us to greater, deeper and unapologetic participation in the part of the church known as the ELCA. We can have a little pride in who we are without irony. I believe I've established my theological heft so I am allowed a little hokeyness. Here it is: We are Team ELCA.

## Synod Assembly News

The SW Washington Synod Assembly was held May 16<sup>th</sup> and 17th at Trinity Lutheran Church in Parkland, near PLU. Trish and I were the delegates from Amazing Grace.

The Assembly was busy with the business of the Synod, time for inspirational speakers, workshops, worship, and fellowship. The theme for this year's assembly was "Hospitality: All are welcome".

There were no major items voted on beyond filling the synod committees and approving the 2015 budget. After a low point in 2011, Mission Support has risen the last two years.

Bishop Richard Jaech outlined his priorities for the Synod: Strengthening Congregations; Strengthening Leaders, both rostered and lay leaders. His vision is training workshops for Pastors, Congregational Council members, including developing a "school" for lay leader training.

Workshops that we attended included: "Generosity that sticks", Seven principles learned from the Macedonians; Welcoming Social Justice ministries to your congregation; "Social Media and Ministry"; and Welcome Committee: What is it and how do we start one.

We have posted some the handouts from the assembly and the workshops on the bulletin board in the fellowship hall. We have also shared information with Amazing Grace committees. If you have questions about Synod Assembly, please talk with Trish or myself.

If you have never attended Synod Assembly, I would strongly urge to consider going. It is an inspirational, spirit filled event, with a lot of positive energy. It is exciting to hear about all the mission activities that various congregations are involved in. We will be nominating next year's delegates at our annual meeting in January, so please talk to anyone on Council about your interest.

- II. Opening devotions were led by Dee.
- III. Prayer tasks were assigned as follows: Thanksgiving/Dee, Intercession/Pastor Val, Petition/Jeannette, Praise/Kristine.
- IV. Chris agreed to act as Time Keeper and Kristine as opinion collector for the meeting.
- V. Mark noted that a quorum was established for the meeting, as all council members were present.
- VI. The Agenda was reviewed and m/s/a.
- VII. The minutes from the last meeting, May 6, 2014, were m/s/a.
- VIII. Financial Reports:
  - Treasurer's Report Chrissie Kincaid
     Bills were As of May 31, 2014 the checking account balance is \$11,382.02 and the paint/maintenance fund is \$2016.10 after the invoice from Lupo.
  - Financial Secretary's Report Mike Kupka.

    Mike submitted the May 2014 Record of Giving which was \$13,122. Total contributions from January 2014 to end of May totals \$74,645.43. Mike is currently working on a report on E giving and reviewing the procedure for depositors.

### IX. Business items:

- A. Stewardship Committee Members Diane and Mark enthusiastically reported that Mike Barkstrom accepted the position as head of stewardship. This is not a council position.
- B. Synod Assembly report Mark reported that he and Trish attended the Synod Assembly. They have posted lots of information they gathered on the back wall in the fellowship hall. He said the priority of the Synod is to strengthen congregations. They each attended workshops and recommended that to each council member to go in the future if given the opportunity.
