Again & Again we return to God, a longing deeper than any other, even for those who consider themselves 'not religious.' Again & Again we fail at our perceived understanding of being 'Godly'. Again & Again God reminds us – you don't have to be anyone or any way than who you are. YOU ARE LOVED. You are mine! I will never leave you!

But, the refrain, Again & Again is not just a churchy saying. The problems and issues in our world and even in our town, always return to similar themes. How many times have we heard or said, "Someone needs to do something about ..." (Insert the issue du jour.) Whether

it's homelessness, food insecurity, more and better jobs, a more welcoming downtown, better options for childcare, better options for healthcare... the list goes on and on until we begin to feel hopeless, as if the problems are beyond our ability to make a difference. Unfortunately, the result of that hopelessness is all too often scapegoating, lashing out at one another or retreating into our own frustrated thinking.

Lent reminds us that yes, problems will always be with us. We will not achieve a perfect world. AND, Again & Again God invites us into the life of making a difference together. Again & Again the prophets have told the people of God that the worship God desires is that the hungry be fed, the houseless are housed, the marginalized are cared for.

Again & Again we are reminded in the wisdom of the cycle of seasons and readings of the church that we are important in the work of God's creating a new heaven and a new earth. We are called to partner with God in that creative work with our every act and every word.

As our congregation discerns how we might be called to use our experience, our resources and our talents to partner with other congregations in the Synod addressing the epidemic of houselessness, I give thanks that Again & Again the people of Amazing Grace have shown themselves to be compassionate and generous. Whatever efforts we have pursued, Again & Again we have met the challenges confronting us with grace. Please join your leadership in praying for wise discernment around this effort and be watching for more information in the days and months to come. Please join me in praying:

God of those in love again with their own home towns;
God of those coming to terms at last with home-grown divisions:
In the work of bringing more peace to the world we begin with peace in ourselves.
Remind us that where each of us starts affects what we see, and who we will meet, and what obstacles there are to overcome.

May we never forget that when we come together, we have travelled different roads; and may we then have a greater respect for where each one has been and what feeling at home can mean. Amen.

ACT NOW TO END RACISM!

The pastors, deacons and chaplains of the Southwestern Washington Synod attended our annual Bishop's Convocation, which focused on the theme: ACT Now! to End Racism! Awaken, Confront and Transform

The purpose of the Convocation, led by Stacy Kitahata, a co-director at Holden Village, was to grow in mind, heart, and skills. Workshops were led by Indigenous Native American, Black, Korean and white leaders from our Synod and related ministries. Participants worked individually and in groups to:

- •sharpen our mental awareness and under standing of racism
- •deepen our heart connection to people of other ethnic groups
- •learn skills that will help our congregations address racism

A Synod Anti-Racism team is now being assembled to plan events and support congregations as we address the racism and unconscious white privilege that divides God's family in many ways. If you would like to volunteer to be a part of this Synod Anti-Racism team, please contact me at jaechre@plu.eduIt is good timing that, as February arrives, we now begin Black History Month. Knowing the stories of the African American community, both their accomplishments and their struggles, is an important part of affirming the dignity and value that God bestows on all of God's people. On the History website (https://www.history.com/tag/blackhistory), and many other websites, there is a rich amount of information to learn, digest, and celebrate this month. Here are a few examples:

Black History Month: The celebration of Black History Month began as "Negro History Week," which was created in 1926 by Carter G. Woodson, a noted African American historian, scholar, educator and publisher. It became a month-long celebration in 1976. The month of February was chosen to coincide with the birthdays of Frederick Douglass and Abraham Lincoln.

Famous Protestors and Activists: While Rosa Parks is credited with helping to spark the Civil Rights movement when she refused to give up her

public bus seat to a white man in Montgomery, Alabama in 1955—inspiring the Montgomery Bus Boycott—the lesser-known Claudette Colvin was arrested nine months prior for not giving up her bus seat to white passengers.

Supreme Court Justice: Thurgood Marshall was the first African American ever appointed to the U.S. Supreme Court. He was appointed by President Lyndon B. Johnson and served on the court from 1967 to 1991.



Eminent Scientist: George Washington Carver, shown above, developed 300 derivative products from peanuts among them cheese, milk, coffee, flour, ink, dyes, plastics, wood stains, soap, linoleum, medicinal oils and cosmetics.

First Woman Representative: Shirley Chisholm was the first African American woman elected to the House of Representatives. She was elected in 1968 and represented the state of New York. First Senator: Hiram Rhodes Revels was the first African American ever elected to the U.S. Senate. He represented the state of Mississippi from February 1870 to March 1871.

In John 17, Jesus prayed, "That they may all be one." I am grateful that the Spirit of Christ is moving strongly among us in these days to dissolve the walls that divide us and bring us into the full unity of God's people, whatever our color or tribe.

The Following is the Synod Committee on Affordable Housing's theological reasons for pursuing that work. Please contact Pastor Val or Curtis Steinhauer, who also serves on the committee, if you have questions.

Affordable Housing: A Christian Vision for the Southwestern Washington Synod "I came that they may have life, and have it abundantly." -John 10:10

"The yearning to belong somewhere, to have a home, to be in a safe place is a deep and moving pursuit." -Walter Brueggemann

As people of faith, we support and affirm the need to promote and advocate for affordable housing in all communities in our synod. At the heart of our sacred story is God's desire for both the spiritual and physical flourishing of God's beloved.

From the moment of their rescue from slavery in Egypt, the people of God rely on God's goodness for their survival and security. And, the end point of their journey to freedom is a real, geographical place; God's promise is fulfilled through the provision of a home.

The biblical narrative also lifts up the promise of place for individuals: "My people will abide in a peaceful habitation, in secure dwellings, and in quiet resting places" (Isaiah 32:18); "they shall all sit under their own vines and under their own fig trees, and no one shall make them afraid; for the mouth of the LORD of hosts has spoken" (Micah 4:4).

This hope-filled vision, however, is quickly lost in housing markets driven by profitability. Low- and middle-income residents often struggle to find affordable housing in the communities where they live and work, contributing to displacement and, in dire cases, homelessness.

How are the people of God called to respond?

God's grace has material implications. It follows that Christian love prioritizes the physical well-being of our neighbors, critical to which is access to housing: "We need to consider not only how our churches welcome the most vulnerable (Matt. 25:40)," writes Jill Suzanne Shook, "but also how our cities reflect hospitality to all income levels." We also affirm our responsibility to advocate for hospitality in our local community policies.

God has fulfilled the promise of place to each of our congregations. To devote church property to the construction of affordable housing is to extend that promise to others in the hope that God's dream for the world might finally be realized.

In partnership with God, who promises abundant life, we invite congregations to discern how God has equipped them to support neighbors in need of safe, affordable housing.

HEALTHY COMMUNICATION IN TOUGH TIMES

Healthy communication is important in the best of times. Throw in a pandemic and political turmoil and things can get messy. In the church we are especially careful to express our love for each other and for all our neighbors by practicing healthy communication skills. Some basics that are helpful in all relationships include the following.

- Everyone speaks for themselves. Each of us needs to take responsibility for expressing our own feelings or concerns.
- When there is a concern, we go directly to the person involved. Honest, direct, loving commu-

- nication is the basis of all healthy relationships.
- If the concern is not resolved after direct communication, we ask a neutral person to join us in that conversation for the sake of understanding and healing.
- We avoid triangulation. Triangulation occurs when one person does not communicate directly with another person, instead using a third person to relay communication to the second. Triangulation distorts relationships and makes clear communication difficult.
- We pray for each other trusting that God loves us all and in prayer can heal our hurts and restore relationships.
