Our Faith 101 classes have mostly begun. Our Thursday group had to delay our first meeting because so many people signed up that more books had to be ordered. (Great problem to have!) The purpose of this class is, as it is for most study within the church, to help us to continue to grow in mature faith.

The author of the book we're studying, N.T. Wright, ends the preface of his book with this thought: "All language about the future as any economist or politician will tell you, is simply a set of signposts pointing into a fog. We see through a glass darkly, says St. Paul as he peers toward what lies ahead. All our language about future states of the world and of ourselves consists of complex pictures that may or may not correspond very well to the ultimate reality. But that doesn't mean it's anybody's guess or that every opinion is as good as every other one. And - supposing someone came forward out of the fog to meet us. That, of course, is the central though often ignored Christian belief."

That 'someone' who came forward, Jesus, meets us as we study scripture, which is why we're using the narrative lectionary; to make clear that the whole story In broad brush strokes the Old Testament follows this of God from Old Testament to New is OUR story. It's all gospel, all good news! That's why we study the teaching of the church, those beliefs that have been tested in the crucible of time and experience and found to be life -giving. We do that in our study of N.T. Wright's book, Surprised by Hope.

That 'someone', Jesus, meets us in wine/blood and bread/body at the table of grace which centers our worship together, sustains us for another week of joyful service as Jesus calls us to serve, loving even our enemies.

That 'someone', Jesus, meets us in prayer, alone or together, praying for ourselves and our concerns and in our prayer for the needs of the world.

But, even all of those ways of meeting Jesus do not exhaust how God wants to be known. The poetry of Hafiz challenges us to embrace the truth that God will surprise us with hope and possibility beyond our imagining when we our hearts are open to God's work in us and in the world.

My prayer is that we are all bold to embrace the hope and the possibility!

WHY ARE WE HEARING SO MUCH OF THE OLD TESTAMENT IN **WORSHIP THESE DAYS?**

The short answer is because we're using a new set of readings (which is what a lectionary is.) We're using the Narrative Lectionary now, which is a four year cycle of scripture readings.

On the Sundays from September through May each year the texts follow the sweep of the biblical story, from Creation through the early Christian church. The intention is to help us understand some of the arc of scripture beginning with the Old Testament and flowing into the Gospels in December.

chronology:

Creation, Abraham and Sarah, and Joseph in Egypt (Genesis);

Slavery in Egypt, the escape, wilderness wanderings (Exodus);

Life in the land of Canna (Joshua);

Land conquered and people stumbling (Judges);

King Saul, David's rise and fall (1-2 Samuel, 1-2 Kings);

First Temple is built; prophets speak of power and its neglect of the powerless and the impending exile (Isaiah, Elijah, Hosea, Jeremiah);

Exile, what it means to live as a God's people in a foreign land (Esther, Daniel);

Prophets in exile (Jeremiah and Ezekiel);

Return to Jerusalem from exile, (Nehemiah, Ezra) and then the second temple built by Herod the Great many years later.

In extremely broad strokes, this is the story of the Old Testament – a people, a temple and a God who is known by steadfast love (hesed) and the guiding Torah relationship and covenant). These principles shape the

relationship and covenant). These principles shape the people of Israel and shape the person of Jesus, the savior of this world.

My hope is that each worship service gives you a better handle on God's story that is not just about folks thousands of years ago, but about you and me. This is a story that is principally about the God of Israel whose steadfast love abides and is living, a God who redeems the world through Jesus life and death and resurrection and who makes lives in the human heart.

It is a story about God who calls out a church, to be a newly created people, transformed into the image of Christ to be, live, and work as the body of Christ for the sake of all. It is a beautiful story; it is the good news of Jesus and the story of God. And as followers of Jesus, it is our story as well!

COMMUNION BREAD RECIPE

Sift together 3 times:

2 cups whole wheat flour

I cup white flour

I-I/4 tsp. baking powder

I-I/4 tsp. salt

Stir in 4 tsp. oil. Set aside



Mix wet ingredients together until dissolved:

3/4 cup & 2 TBS very hot water

3 TBS honey

3 TBS molasses

Add wet to dry ingredients and mix well. Should be slightly sticky. Do not knead.

Divide into 4 balls; flatten each into a 1/4 inch thick disk. Score each

Bake at 350 degrees for 10 minutes. Remove, brush top with oil. Bake another 5-8 minutes.

ELCA members advocate for action on climate change

CHICAGO (ELCA) – Hundreds of members of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America (ELCA) were among the more than 400,000 participants in the People's Climate March in New York City on Sept. 21. The Lutheran delegation joined the People's Climate Interfaith Contingent, one of the largest groups in the march.

"As a Lutheran, I feel that I was given the responsibility to hold domain over nature, that is to protect it and nurture it," said Kristin Heinemeier, a member of Lutheran Church of the Incarnation in Davis, Calif., who traveled from home with her I4-year-old son to participate in the march.

"Nature is God's gift to us and it's beautiful. This is clearly an issue of interest to the faith community, and

I'm proud to be representing my congregation and church body in this march," she said.

Heinemeier's son, Peter Holderbein, said he participated in the march to "protect my future and the future of my children.

"God trusted us to protect the planet," said Holderbein. "As a teenager, young people have a lot more voice than we think and we should be more involved in decision-making."

The People's Climate March kicked off a week of events in New York City, including the United Nations Climate Summit on Sept. 23, where President Obama and other global leaders will meet to discuss climate change.

"This summit begins a two-year period of global attention to the issue of climate change," said Mary Minette, ELCA director for environmental education and advocacy, who also attended the march. "In December, world leaders will convene in Lima,

Peru, under the United Nations Framework Convention on Climate Change to discuss a new global agreement on climate change, with the hope that a final agreement will emerge by the United Nations Framework Convention on Climate Change meeting in Paris in December of 2015."

The ELCA advocacy office, based in Washington, D.C., and the ELCA New York Metropolitan Area Synod office worked to help Lutherans from around the country attend the march by providing information on housing and transportation.

"We prioritized this event because our global partnerships give us a unique understanding of the impact that climate change is already having on the food security and livelihoods of vulnerable people and communities around the world," said Minette. "We know that climate change is already impacting our church's work to alleviate

and eliminate hunger and threatens the future well-being of all. We believe that we are called to be stewards of God's good creation and to care for our neighbors, whoever and wherever they may be."

Heinemeier said she was "very proud to be marching with Lutherans, because of the strong commitment many Lutherans have made. The energy of the group was very positive and life affirming, she said.

"Being surrounded by a large number of Lutherans among a throng of thousands singing 'We are marching to the light of God,' a song we sing often in our church, gave me a strong sense of community," she said. "I think the march illustrated all the different communities that care about the planet, from faith groups to unions to farmers to scientists."

Other events during the week include an interfaith conference on climate change sponsored by the World Council of Churches. Minette will attend the conference, along with a delegation from The Lutheran World Federation, a global communion of 144 churches representing more than 72 million Christians in 79 countries. The ELCA is the communion's only member church from the United States.



Ebola Outbreak: "The Church Has to Help" From Lutheran Disaster Response

The 2014 Ebola outbreak in West Africa is the largest and longest-lasting Ebola outbreak in recorded history. To further understand the scale of this disease, the Ebola outbreak is actually the first Ebola epidemic the world has experienced, as the virus has spread to multiple countries, including Liberia, Sierra Leone and Guinea. More than 2,400 people have died from Ebola during this epidemic.

The spread of Ebola presents several more complications than just battling and containing the virus itself. People in infected areas have been quarantined to their homes as towns shut down to try to limit the disease from spreading further. As a result, people are not able to work, harvest fields or purchase food. Other countries that ship food to the region are afraid to dock their ships to deliver food for fear of contracting the virus. The lack of food has been a growing concern as people are now dealing with food security issues that have been exacerbated by the spread of Ebola.

"We need food," says the Rev. D. Jensen Seyenkulo, Bishop of the Lutheran Church in Liberia. "Our workers from all across the country are being asked to take off work during the crisis. The quarantined communities and stranded travelers are crying for food and water. The treatment centers need food. There is a saying around now that goes like this: 'If we do not die of Ebola, we will die of starvation.'"

In August, Lutheran Disaster Response committed \$10,000 to assist Global Health Ministries in the shipment of Personal Protective Equipment (PPE) to Liberia. Lutheran Disaster Response is now committing \$90,000 to assist with food distributions in Liberia and Sierra Leone and with Ebola sensitization and prevention in Liberia, the country that currently has experienced the highest number of Ebola cases.

Food Distributions in Liberia and Sierra Leone

The Evangelical Lutheran Church in America (ELCA) and its predecessor church have walked with the people of Liberia for more than 150 years. Our long-standing relationship with our companions in Liberia and Sierra Leone provides a strong foundation to respond holistically to the needs of those who are suffering and living with the threat of Ebola.


We will work with our companion church, the Lutheran Church in Liberia, to activate food distributions in six targeted areas of Liberia that will assist 999 households with a month's supply of oil, rice and fish.

In Sierra Leone, we will work with the our companion church, the Evangelical Lutheran Church of Sierra Leone, to provide food assistance also consisting of oil, rice and fish to 3000 individuals.

"With no way to buy food, the church has to help," says the Rev. Thomas Barnett, Bishop of the Evangelical Lutheran Church of Sierra Leone.

Ebola Sensitization and Prevention in Liberia

Liberia has seen the highest number of Ebola cases since the outbreak reached the country in March. Since the disease presents a 9

The Rapture

Action movies can be fun and entertaining. But when an action movie disguises itself as being Biblically based, clarification is in order. This weekend the new movie "Left Behind" based on the books of the same name, premiers. Pastor Tim Krick of Christ the King Lutheran Church in Combined Locks, WI says this about the movie and the ideas on which it's based:

"The premise of the books and movie is simple. The rapture has occurred. Meaning, God has taken up to heaven all the true believers and left the rest of us behind to face 7 years of trials and tribulations in which the anti-Christ will rise to power. The world is catapulted into war, poverty, suffering and endless turmoil as the people left figure out what happened and how do they survive.

Let me put this simply. The movie is not biblical nor is the concept of the rapture what we believe as Christians and not just ELCA Christians, but the majority of Christians in the world. The idea of the rapture, people being snatched up to heaven is actually a very recent idea that came to prominence in the 1800's by a man named John Nelson Darby. It promotes a theology, a way of thinking about God that is very unhelpful and perhaps even dangerous."

Our new book and Bible study based on *Surprised by Hope* by N.T. Wright is meant to shed light on just this sort of misuse of scripture. This is what happens when we don't read the Bible for ourselves and in the company of others who can help us discern truth from propaganda. This is what happens when we don't know church history.

Pastor Krick also provides some helpful links that do a great job of explaining the faults of rapture theology. If you take a few minutes to read or watch one or two of the videos you'll see why we don't believe in rapture theology and will help explain what we do believe.
