I have been living with (and struggling with) the assigned readings for these weeks of summer 2021, weeks in which it feels as if we are living a liminal life. Liminal in the sense of already, but not yet, on the verge of something unrealized: vaccinated but still living with the threat of 'variants'; unmasked but maybe not for long; enjoying the beauty of a warm summer but lamenting that it is probably a foretaste of climate change effects to come, and so on and so on and so on...

Liminal life may be a way to understand what John offers us in chapter 6, the extended story of Jesus feeding the 5000 and the aftermath of it: after multiplying 5 loaves and 2 fish he walks on water, runs from the crowd that wants to forcibly crown him and he advises us to look deeper into our hungers and see that it's not really bread we hunger for; that flour, water, and salt keep us alive, but once that need is met we still hunger for that deeper thing, that more profound need - God.

In the face of that hunger, Jesus promises us: You already have what you long for! **I am** the bread of life. Partake of me. Draw so close to me that it's as if you are filled with me and I will give you true life now and into eternity.

It's a lot to process in these days. It pushes us to ask, "What am I doing to satisfy that true hunger?" Am I drawing closer to Jesus or do I fear being that close, that committed to Jesus? Are there ways I'm trying to fill that hunger with things other than Jesus? For me, those things might be: staying busy, seeking entertainment, focusing on other things like ministry and ways to "love my neighbor"; fine pursuits in themselves. But, if they are used as ways to avoid communing with Jesus, they will never satisfy.

Jesus offers us life, true life and we are tempted to translate that into things we need to DO rather than just BE-ING with Jesus in prayer, contemplation, quiet.

It's pretty well established that our 'doing' should flow out of our 'being' with Jesus. Then it makes sense. Then loving our neighbor becomes possible in every act of kindness and every act is multiplied to feed the people.

On Sunday, June 13th, Bishop Jaech blessed us with the Gospel message. After worship he offered more information about how the Synod is partnering with us in the effort to make affordable housing available throughout the Synod.

Bishop Jaech offers this insightful information from Julie Diamond to encourage us in these days.

Here in Oregon, just over half the population has been vaccinated. California and New York officially opened up for business this week. For many of us, starting to come out of isolation can be awkward. Conversations that used to start with, "How are you?" now start with, "How has it been for you?"

I surprised myself by how truthfully I've answered this question: In this past year I've had to focus more intentionally on my emotional health than I ever have before. I'm not alone. The mental toll the pandemic exacted was considerable, and ongoing. A study published in JAMA Network Open found depression rates had more than tripled since the pandemic.

But the pandemic didn't assault our mental wellbeing so much as tip it over. It was already reeling from the stress and strain of four, tumultuous years of the Trump presidency, a combative, polarized political climate, police shootings of Black Americans, as well as wildfires, floods, and storms of biblical proportions.

In truth, though, our emotional and mental well-being has been slowly and steadily eroding for years. The culprit? Well, many things, but it's hard not to point a finger at the internet, particularly what was once called Web 2.0, the user generated era of the internet. Consider this. Since the advent of smartphones, teenagers who reported symptoms of major depression, grew by 52%. And among young adults aged 18-25, it grew by 63%. We don't watch the news anymore, rather, we consume content designed to feed our outrage and solidify and justify our beliefs—driving us deeper and deeper into our tribes. We're swimming in a sea of social comparison, which is not good at all. Especially for young people. There's a correlation between the amount of

time young teenage girls spend on social media, and their long-term risk for suicide. Study after study finds that the more time we spend on social media, the lonelier, more isolated, and less self-confident we feel.

We're in a state of 24/7 reactivity. Our nerves are frazzled, our patience worn thin. Aggression and incivility are the norm. The age of the internet has unleashed tremendous power. Power we don't yet know how to wield responsibly. The power the internet gives diminishes our inhibition—people are freer to act without filters. It removes the guard rails of social norms, allowing us a freedom never before available on such a scale: the freedom to behave anti -socially without repercussion. Face-to-face interaction holds us accountable because the repercussions of violating social norms are considerable. It is an inhibiting force. Being seen, being known, and being in close proximity to others imposes a self-correcting mechanism or restraint that results in (mostly) civil behavior.

But the internet removes those social norms and customs:

- It removes visibility (it affords us the protection of anonymity)
- It removes proximity (we can't be physically threatened)
- It reduces response time (we don't have to consider and reflect on the consequences of our responses)
- It removes the need to justify your opinion (we do not have to validate or prove our opinions through research or facts)

In the wake of the constant trolling, trending topics of outrage, and click bait disguised as news, I've come to a appreciate a little inhibition. I don't have to react to everything. I can let some things go. I can repress my response. Why? Well, it's in my own best interest. I don't agree with what a friend posts on Facebook. Or, my neighbors on their politics. But I depend on them, to pick something up at the store if

my car breaks down, watch my children if I get sick, jump start the car if needed.

But it's much more than that. It's about mental well-being. The more we react, the more we feed the addiction to outrage and anger, and the less we give ourselves pause, time to reflect and think and 'think again.' The more time we spend in a hyper-aroused state, the worse our health, the unhappier we become, and the less intelligent our actions and choices.

With great power comes great responsibility. If the social guardrails have been removed, then it's up to us to self-regulate. But that's not enough. This is not just an individual problem. It's a societal one. I often look to history for parallels. The industrial revolution unleashed tremendous and equally upsetting social turmoil. And it took almost 200 years, from the late 18th century to the early 20th century, for governments to enact the first labor protection laws.

There's always a lag between what humans can create and what humans know how to live with. We aren't designed to be in a state of emotional arousal for hours at a time. We aren't designed to stare at a screen for 8 hours a day. And society won't work if we're being primed to make enemies out of people who disagree with us.

We're living with this newfound power, but we're not living *well* with it. It's going to take quite a while to learn how to live well with it. Perhaps the toll it's taking on our mental health and our social health will be a wakeup call and help us get there sooner.

A DEEPLY SPIRITUAL ACT

The first-century church in <u>Corinth</u> must have been a lively place. Its members were competitive, jealous, divided into factions and litigious. The congregation was diverse. There were Jews and gentiles, rich and poor, men and women, young and old, those brand new to the faith and those with more maturity.

Paul spent over 18 months establishing the church in Corinth. He worked with, lived with and loved these people. Paul wanted them to know the risen Christ and the life of love and freedom found in Christ.

While the Corinthians were enthusiastic, they weren't very disciplined. They argued about which of them had the superior spiritual pedigree—those baptized by Paul or those baptized by Apollos. They took each other to court. And when they gathered for the Lord's Supper—neither decently nor in good order—Paul wrote, "When you come together, it is not really to eat the Lord's supper. For when the time comes to eat, each of you goes ahead with your own supper, and one goes hungry and another becomes drunk" (1 Corinthians 11:20-21).

At his <u>ascension</u>, Jesus told his disciples that they would "receive power when the Holy Spirit has come upon you; and you will be my witnesses in Jerusalem, in all Judea and Samaria, and to the ends of the earth" (Acts 1:8). The church in Jerusalem was the foundation of the Christian movement. It became the parent of the churches founded by the apostles throughout the world.

The decision had been taken at the Council at Jerusalem to welcome gentiles into the way of Jesus. This was a critically important decision and a difficult one. It wasn't universally embraced by everyone. And the saints in Jerusalem had fallen on hard times. Famine threatened the city. Paul organized a massive stewardship campaign among the gentile churches to send aid to the church in Jerusalem.

Paul would have done well as a development officer. He urged the believers to give generously and cheerfully. He set them up to compete with each other to see which church could be most generous. The enthusiastic Corinthians jumped at the chance, espe-

cially if they could do better than the Macedonians! But their lack of discipline was stronger than their zeal, and their stewardship campaign faltered.

Paul wasn't going to have it. In his second letter to the Corinthians, he laid out the spiritual basis for giving: it was about opening the self and the community, it was about glorifying God, it was a new way of thinking about sufficiency.

"And God is able to provide you with every blessing in abundance, so that by always having enough of everything, you may share abundantly in every good work" (2 Corinthians 9:8).

The concept of sufficiency had changed over the centuries. In Cynic and Stoic philosophy, true self-sufficiency was attained when a person became completely independent, with no need of anyone or anything else. By the time Paul wrote to the church in Corinth, self-sufficiency meant not just having enough for oneself but having enough to give away to others. One could have all the wealth and power and status in the world, but if one didn't share with others, that person was not self-sufficient. Contrast the rich young man who could give nothing away with the poor widow who gave everything. The rich young man went away grieving. The widow gave freely.

Stewardship is a deeply spiritual act. It moves us out of ourselves and toward the neighbor in need. It glorifies God. It brings freedom from wealth and status. It unclenches our hands and hearts. It lets us rest in the promise of God's abundance. We become cheerful givers.

When a poet begins a poem they do not know what the end will be, rather they follow each image given, each metaphor and line trusting the *leap*, trusting what flows from the pen, marveling at what emerges. I picture you marveling, Poet God, observing with curiosity what has flowed after you first put your pen to paper entrusting us with the unfolding Poem of our lives.

You cry with us, your tears, salt-roses blooming on the page of the collective Poem, because the Poem writes the bare truth of the pain. We know you are with us, reading every agony.

The Poem of planet Earth is hurting. We pray for the communities, human and non-human, that are intensely experiencing the way we have negatively impacted our home with our resource-affecting choices. In the Western **United States** as oppressive heat and fires rage on for a third week. In **India** where monsoon season lighting strikes, killed dozens and injured many this weekend. In the **United States** where Florida manatees are dying of starvation in record numbers due to polluted waters killing off their food source of seagrass.

May we feel your presence in our grief, in our longing, in our fear. You weep with us. We have the collective creativity to rewrite a way of living upon the Earth as healers. May we have the courage to live into the creativity you have given us, to make real the Poem we want to see. We give thanks for conservation efforts in **Kazakhstan** where there has been restoration of the population of the once critically endangered Saigia Antelope. We give thanks for the **European Union's** sweeping raft of climate change proposals aimed at carbon neutrality by 2050.

All through the COVID-19 pandemic we have seen the disparity between nations and within nations in access to healthcare, we see so clearly which communities are most impacted and now who has access to the vaccine. We are not meant to live in a Poem that is so out of balance. We pray for vaccine access where needed, especially for the 11 eleven countries that only have 1% percent of the population vaccinated including; Chad, Burkina Faso and Papua New Guinea. We pray for places around the world experiencing second, third, fourth and fifth waves. We pray for **Iraq** where a fire caused by faulty wiring on an oxygen tank in the COVID isolation ward killed 92 and injured many. In this anguish on top of anguish we do not have words, but know you are with us in our speechlessness.

We are daily invited to pick up the pen of our lives and co-create with You, Poet God. How do we live as the Poem we are created to be?

We write the Poem by living fully in love, in curiosity, in compassion, in connection, and in creativity allowing all that is to be felt, expressed and honored.

We thank you Poet God for writing us into being and continuing to co-create with us. May we see that we are given all we need in your Love for the composition of our lives.

HEALTHY COMMUNICATION IN TOUGH TIMES

Healthy communication is important in the best of times. Throw in a pandemic and political turmoil and things can get messy. In the church we are especially careful to express our love for each other and for all our neighbors by practicing healthy communication skills. Some basics that are helpful in all relationships include the following.

- Everyone speaks for themselves. Each of us needs to take responsibility for expressing our own feelings or concerns.
- When there is a concern, we go directly to the person involved. Honest, direct, loving com-

- munication is the basis of all healthy relationships.
- If the concern is not resolved after direct communication, we ask a neutral person to join us in that conversation for the sake of understanding and healing.
- We avoid triangulation. Triangulation occurs when one person does not communicate directly with another person, instead using a third person to relay communication to the second. Triangulation distorts relationships and makes clear communication difficult.
- We pray for each other trusting that God loves us all and in prayer can heal our hurts and restore relationships.
