# Healing is owning our scars without being defined by them

The resurrected Jesus

still bore the scars of the nails that caused his death. Jesus invited his friends to touch those scars, to see for themselves that he was still Jesus, still the one who loved them; the same in important ways, but, profoundly changed. He carried the scars of the violence that killed him into the new creation that put an end to the power of death.

Whatever pain and brokenness we experience stays with us in this life. It shapes us and recreates us. Our hope is in choosing the shape that new creation takes. We cannot choose whether we will experience brokenness in our lives. Being alive means we

are vulnerable to beauty and to pain. The choice we have is to let the brokenness deform us or to let God's healing power transform it so that it can be integrated into the wholeness of God's new creation.

Prayers for healing have been a part of the church's ministry since the first century. Healing services of the church connect with this ancient practice, inviting all who sense a need for God's healing to come forward. People may request prayers for themselves or someone else or just ask for prayer with no need specifically named. This healing may involve any aspect of one's life -- physical, emotional, spiritual, financial, employment, one's family, etc.

Healing is grounded in scripture which offers diverse examples. We see that Jesus rejects the idea that sin causes impairment in John 9:3, telling the disciples that a man was born blind through real power of prayer in the face of no one's fault but in order to provide an opportunity for revelation. cured, but they aren't healed. However, in Mark 2 he first forgives and then heals a man who is paralyzed. In Luke 8:48, Jesus tells a woman who has been cured of a long-standing illness merely by touching his garment: "Daughter, your faith has made you well; go in peace."

What we see in scripture is a multi-faceted witness to the power of healing. Luther offers us some guidance. He didn't see illness as punishment from God for our sins. Repentance won't cure us. He taught that people should seek medical care and care for their health as much as possible. His perspective remains reasonable. We pray for the healing of the sick, but we also see that those for whom we pray aren't alwavs made well. The Bible's healing stories don't necessarily

give us clarity. We still ask, "What can prayer do?" "Should our faith be sufficient to cure our illnesses?" "Why are we suffering to begin with?"

As Christians in the 21<sup>st</sup> century living in a scientific age and benefitting greatly from it we see that there is a difference between healing and curing. Curing means eliminating sickness and restoring someone to health. Sometimes that happens, and when it does we give God thanks and praise. Healing means bringing people to wholeness, providing what they need to live joyfully even in the midst of sickness and suffering. More often than not healing is the sickness. Many people are And many people die from sickness, but they died healed. They are whole.

Our world and community feel fractured, broken in many ways. Many of us experience this fracture also in our families, in our workplace, in the disconnect we feel from those around us; in the difficulty of finding meaning or even hope in a world that feels so unlike the world of our childhood.

We even experience that fracture in relationships within the congregation as expectations are unmet or disagreements cause confusion or hurt feelings. Differences of opinion cause divisions that feel too wide to overcome and changes take place that cause us to feel disconnected from our cherished ideas of church.

Healing prayer addresses all aspects of brokenness.

May 17<sup>th</sup> we will offer a service of healing at our regular Sunday morning worship at Amazing Grace. Pastor Richard Kraiger will preach from his experience of healing and Pastor Val will preside. You are invited to join in this time of healing bringing your whole self: your joy and pain, your places of health and those parts of yourself that feel broken Whether you are struggling with depression, addiction, anxiety or you've received a frightening diagnosis, healing is possible. Whether you're wrestling with chronic pain or you're brokenhearted over an unreconciled relationship, whatever your need bring it to the prayer of healing.

#### Prayer changes things. Healing is possible.

The healing ministry of the church is meant to be a complement to the work of doctors, nurses, and hospitals. We cannot promise a cure for those for whom we pray. Rather, we offer these gifts: God's presence in time of suffering, God's promise of peace, and God's love embodied in the community of the faithful. Please join your community of faith in experiencing and sharing this gift of healing..



We need to share and ask for support in our network of friends, of family, church, or community where people will not be scandalized when they hear that our once cherished relationships are complicated, difficult, less than perfect, or gone altogether. And gradually, when the time is right, we need encouragement to step through and beyond our grief into new and renewed relationships of trust, where we once again recover our ability to care for others and our sense of humor.

#### **River Campers**

As most of you know the City of Aberdeen has been trying to evict homeless campers from private property along the Chehalis River. Pastor Val and Rev. Sarah Monroe have been involved with this group of homeless people, going to meetings with the city and various agencies.

Pastor Val has done an excellent job of keeping the council informed about this situation. As council president, I thought it was very important to get the congregation up to speed, so they could prayerfully participate in the discernment process, asking what God is calling us to do and how it fits with our stated mission.



On Sunday, April 26, I asked Pastor to speak to the congregation during fellowship and to share with the congregation some of the same information that she had previously shared with council, outlining the meetings she has gone to in the last year and half on this subject, and her relationships with some of the people on the river. She spoke about the Washington law that allows churches to host tent camps for up to 90 days. There is one other church in South Aberdeen that is also considering providing space for them, but their location may not be as convenient to services.

It was a good sharing session, a chance to listen and to be heard, with good questions about how we would do this safely, concerns about drug abuse and safety for children at the preschool and in the youth center. Pastor pointed out that some of the youth, who have been at the youth center are also camping by the river. Pastor said that most of the campers who have drug problems have been through treatment, but are still using drugs, and that others are suffering from mental illness or PTSD. Others shared that they feel we are called to do this, at least one of whom had previous experience at her former church. Some just asked clarifying questions. Some people questioned whether this would just be enabling the campers to continue a lifestyle with drugs and dependency.

Pastor used the opportunity to reinforce her sermon on how the earlier church did discernment with prayer, spiritual practices, and knowing that God goes before us and prepares the way. We asked and continue ask people to pray about what to do next and asked them to share their concerns/ideas with members of the council.

## Holy Conversations By Bishop Richard E. Jaech

#### Dear Friends.

Conversations is the name of an Alban Institute publication by Gil Rendle and Alice • Mann, in which they present a congregation's strategic planning process as an intentional Spiritual practice. Of all the helpful • insights and practical steps presented in that book, it is the name, Holy Conversations, that has stuck with me the most. It moves me to know that the Spirit of God is con-. stantly among us and within us throughout all of our conversations, particularly when we are trying to discern where God is leading us. Like Moses standing before the burning bush, we discover that we are standing on holy ground when God calls us to a new path.

At our Synod Assembly just a few weeks from now, we will explore how to engage more fully in the holy conversations that will guide and strengthen our congregations and Synod. Since a good conversation requires listening as well as speaking, we will examine and practice the Three Great Listenings, an approach described by Stephen Bouman in his book, The Mission Table. These Three Great Listenings are: listening to God, listening to each other in our congregation, and listening to our neighbors in the community around us.

Through this listening, and the holy conversations that follow, we discover:

- Where is God calling us?
- What gifts and passions for ministry has God given to us?
- What are the needs and hopes of our neighbors and how can we minister to them?
- What are the gifts of our neighbors and how can they join with us in ministry?

Pastor Bouman, who is the national director of the ELCA's Office of Congregational and Synodical Mission will himself speak at the Assembly. We will also have good conversations around each table about our own congregations and neighborhoods.

Along with having these holy conversations at the Synod Assembly, we will also enjoy good worship, fun fellowship, tasty meals and a few important business items. I look forward to being with all of you - pastors, AIM's and lay voting members – at the Assembly. May God bless you in everything that you do!

The quilter's just sent their second shipment of the year to the Lutheran World Relief. In this shipment


we included 152



Now in Grays Harbor, <u>Plant-A-Row</u> is an easy way to healthfully address hunger in our community. Launched in 1995, Plant-A-Row is a national program created by the Garden Writers Association that encourages garden communities and individuals to donate fresh vegetables, fruit and herbs to people in need.

WHY DONATE? Did you know that low-income families have the highest rates of obesity/chronic disease and hunger in our community? Produce from your farm or garden helps provide access to fresh, nutritious food. Gardening provides physical activity, stress relief, family bonding, community bonding, learning opportunities, fresh food for healthy eating, time outdoors and FUN! Start your own garden in your backyard or join in with others to participate.

WHAT TO DONATE? While many vegetables and fruits grow well in our maritime climate (greens, grains, beans, berries), some do not (citrus, melons, hot peppers). We love when people challenge themselves in the garden, but we encourage you to plant nutritious vegetables and fruits that grow well in our climate. Sought after vegetables include cabbage, beets, kale, squash, green beans and salad greens. What would you grow for you or your family?

**SAFETY GUIDELINES:** In order to keep the recipients of your generous donation safe, we cannot accept produce grown with animal manure not composted to USDA Organic Standards or sprayed with pesticides within two weeks of harvest.

## GUIDELINES FOR HANDLING FRESH FRUIT AND VEGETABLES:

- 1. Pick early in the day for best quality.
- 2. Keep produce out of the heat and in the shade.
- 3. For delicate produce like tomatoes and berries, avoid deep containers; the weight on top damages produce below.
- 4. Deliver to local food banks soon after harvest to retain freshness and quality. Make sure to visually inspect produce for bugs and brush away any visible dirt before donating.
