THANK YOU everyone for your prayers and for rejoicing with Steve and I as we welcome Harriet Marilyn Swanson Garney to the world and to our family. The PSALM group and I are reading *Barking to the Choir* by Fr. Greg Boyle as part of our JustFaith study. In the book, Fr. Greg talks about the 14th century mystic Dame Julian of Norwich who thought "the truest and most authentic spiritual life was one that produced awe, humility, and love." Fr. Boyle goes on to say, "But awe gets lost in that triad. We are at our healthiest when we are most situated in awe, and at our least healthy when we engage in judgment. Judgment creates the distance that moves us away from each other. Judgment keeps us in the competitive game and is always self-aggrandizing. Standing at the margins with the broken reminds us not of our own superiority but of our own brokenness. Awe is the great leveler. The

embrace of **our own** suffering helps us to land on a spiritual intimacy with ourselves and others. For if we don't welcome our own woundedness, we will be tempted to despise the wounded."¹

As the pandemic stretches on and on our patience grows thin, our compassion grows weary and it's natural for us to look for someone to blame or to jump to judgments, even without realizing that's what we're doing. So, in this time, relying on a few simple spiritual practices can help us live as our best selves. Mindfulness is talked about everywhere right now. But it has been a Christian spiritual practice at least since the time of Saint Benedict in the fifth century who taught the monks to pay attention to every moment as sacred, every action as worship, every guest as Christ himself.

In that light, I offer the following practice as a simple way into mindfulness. Since mindfulness really just means being awake and paying attention in every moment, we can use the closest thing we have to remind us to pay attention – our breath. The yoga tradition formalized this, but it can be used by everyone who HAS breath whether you're a yogi or not!

You can begin with a Breath Prayer, like this: **Breathe in: The light of Christ. Breathe out: Shine through me**. As you breathe in, think to yourself, "The light of Christ" and as you breathe out think, "Shine through me." (other prayers might be: Breathe in: God of peace, Breathe out: Calm my spirit. Or Breathe in: Creator of all that is, Breath out: Fill my heart with your love.

What you think or say is not important. What is important is the intention to be present to God in this moment. It physically **calms your body even more if your out-breath is longer than your in-breath**. So, you could simply begin by counting your in-breath for a count of 4 and your out-breath for a count of 6. When you're comfortable with that, move to the prayer with words.

Mindfulness can be the pattern of our lives: our eating, our walking and talking, how we clean the house or walk the dog, everything. It is simply noticing (and giving thanks) for every single thing in every single moment. Then, letting go of that moment and moving on to the next.

Mindfulness is so powerful because it forces us to live in the present without grieving the past or worrying

about the future, simply giving thanks for THIS moment, whatever it holds. When we are present in the moment, we can make room for our own woundedness and that of everyone else. We can see all people through the light of Christ's love. It helps us to be present with the people around us and to truly listen to them with an open heart. When we can do that we are much more likely to "stand in awe of what they carry rather than to stand in judgment of their actions."

Prayer: God of our past, our present and our future, we give thanks for this moment and for the people of Amazing Grace and those we long to share your love with in our community. Guide us in your wisdom, in your patience, and in your courage. In Jesus' name we pray. Amen. Pastor Val

STEWARDSHIP NEWS

In addition to that, the congregation received two substantial amounts of money, one from the sale of the Bel Aire property and one from the estate of Jim Erickson, long time member and friend who died last winter. In order for everyone to be informed of the process by which those monies were received and distributed we have an update from Mark Smalley, chair of the committee tasked by council to oversee the sale of the property and from Joelle Buckman, council president.

The Bel Aire property which sat unused and for sale for years, finally sold and despite the complicated history of that property, it is good to have that sale finalized. We give great thanks for the faithful, diligent work of Mike O'Connor who served as realtor and advisor through the process. Now, we can put that part of our history behind us and look to the future. The tithe from the sale of that property will make a difference for years to come through the work of the agencies that received it.

BEL AIRE PROPERY REPORT Update from Committee Chair, Mark Smalley

The Bel Aire Property Committee met March 2nd and 7th, 2021 via Zoom. The Committee was composed of Mike and Karen Barkstrom, Mike O'Conner, Mark and Amy Ostwald, Gene Schermer, Curtis Steinhauer, Phil Stegemoeller, Kristine Finazzo, Liz Ellis, and Pastor Val.

The March 2nd meeting started with Prayer and focus on Amazing Grace's Mission and Values.

Mark Smalley explained the purpose of the committee as directed by the Church Council was:

1. Review the offer that was recently presented to the church council. Is the price and

In order to keep everyone informed about the sale of the Bel Aire property and the process that led to it, we've held several after worship meetings in person and on zoom. The committee that council tasked with deciding what to do with the proceeds from the sale reported on their work after they were finished. Following in this newsletter is a recap so that everyone can read the official summary again. For the sake of clear communication which supports the health of the congregation, please contact committee members or council members if you have any questions.

Council has been waiting on the legal process surrounding the Erickson estate to unfold, before deciding how best to disburse the money which was designated by Jim to be given to Amazing Grace Lutheran Church. Council directed Pastor Val to form a committee to develop a Gift Policy to be added to the congregation's bylaws. It will be presented to the congregation when finalized and voted upon at the next annual meeting. The committee has consulted ELCA Foundation advisors for help in developing that policy.

structure of the offer reasonable to forward to the congregation for approval?

- 2. Look at the recent efforts of the SW WA Synod Affordable Housing Initiative and how this initiative could impact a decision on proceeding with the sale of the Bel Aire Property.
- 3. Look at the local affordable housing work that is being proposed and determine if this could impact a decision on proceeding with the sale of the Bel Aire Property.
- 4. In viewing the mission of our church, what is the most appropriate way to move forward with this property?

Gene gave a description of the source of the money that originally purchased the property being from the sale of the Trinity Lutheran building for \$255,000 at the merger of the two congregations and the Bel Aire property was purchased for \$231,000, with the excess going to the Endowment fund. We reviewed the 2015 congregational vote to sell the property and place the money into the endowment fund.

Mike O'Conner then outlined the current offer on \$70,000 on the property that would be paid over time. There is no fee, as Mike O'Conner is donating his services, and the church pays the closing costs. Mike went over the history of how long the property had been on the market and how few offers had been made and how various offers that we have had that did not work out. Mike also reviewed comparable sales.

After much discussion a motion to suspend the decision to accept or reject the offer until the next meeting of this committee on March 7th was **MSP**.

Curtis Steinhauer outlined the SW WA Synod Affordable Housing Initiative and how that ties in with the local Affordable Housing work. The Bel Aire property was analyzed by an affordable housing construction Company, Blockable, and determined that it was not a good property for this initiative and suggested a property swap for a more appropriate piece of property.

The meeting closed with prayer.

The March 7th meeting started with Prayer

WHAT THE CHURCH COUNCIL HAS BEEN UP TO DURING COVID

Our main goal has been to keep our congregation safe from Covid. We've also worked hard to keep the business side of the church running as smoothly as possible, this has been helped greatly by the continued support of the entire congregation, through both financial giving and giving of their time as safety protocols allowed. During this time of limited contact with everyone, we have tried to be as transparent and open as our limited communications have allowed.

In addition to keeping the church running, the council members have been dealing with the effects of

\$2691, with a closing date of March 23rd. **Motion to accept the offer was MSP**.

Curtis explained that there a range of participation levels for the congregation from just purchasing the property that the county would build housing on and would manage, up to a possibility where the congregation could have more interactions with the people that would be housed. The target group for the housing would not be the homeless, but would be those who are working, but are having trouble finding housing. The housing supply in Grays Harbor is so low, that all housing constructed will free up other housing for rentals.

Motion to recommend to the church council, the property be sold, with a strong recommendation that the proceeds from that sale go into a savings account until the congregation has had to opportunity to evaluate what to do with those funds. M/S/P Motion Carries

The committee recommended that the council to appoint a committee to prepare information for the congregation about the affordable housing options. Information is to be available to the congregation by March 28th with an informational meeting for the congregation scheduled for April 11th to be held on zoom and in person as far as possible, safely. A congregation meeting to vote on use of the proceeds of the Bel Aire property will be scheduled for as soon as is practical considering Covid restrictions.

The meeting closed with prayer.

Covid on their personal lives as well. The isolation and fears that all of you have been experiencing have also been affecting all of the council members, in addition to other personal stressors occurring at the same time. One of the changes we made was to split our council meetings into 2 meetings each month and hold them via Zoom. This allowed us to keep our meetings limited to one hour. We are hoping to be back to in person meetings soon, and switching back to once a month.

Some of the major issues that have come up during the pandemic involve large sums of money. The first being the sale of the Bel Aire Property. Mark Smalley has provided some more specific details on how that process worked out. 90% of the money

from the sale has been transferred to the Endowment Fund and the remaining 10% has been tithed to the organizations we normally tithe to. The other money that we have received has come from the estate of Jim Erickson. We have received funds from his life insurance annuities and are waiting on the final disposition of his estate. The funds that have been received (\$313,465) are being transferred to the En-

dowment Fund. It will be up to all of us, as a congregation, to best decide what to do with these funds.

We need your presence and comfort, Creating God, as news of natural disasters reaches us from around the world: wildfires in **Israel** which are now under control, but burned more than 4,200 acres, a water shortage on the Colorado River impacting around 40 million people in the United States and Mexico, fatal flooding in Ethiopia's capital, Addis Ababa, wildfires in France that consumed over 14,000 acres and injured dozens, a 7.2-magnitude earthquake in Haiti, which has claimed nearly 2,000 lives so far, where heavy rains brought by Tropical Storm Grace have hampered the search for survivors, where almost 10,000 people have been injured, and hospitals are overwhelmed, where the UN says about 500,000 children now have limited or no access to shelter, safe water, and food...

We desperately need your healing, Loving God, as the world continues to battle COVID-19: leaders in New South Wales, **Australia**, are tightening rules in response to a surge in cases, authorities in Wuhan, **China**, are testing the entire population after a handful of new cases were reported, the World Health Organization has seized counterfeit vaccines in **India** and **Africa** even as WHO leaders are urging a pause in vaccine boosters to allow low-income countries to vaccinate their residents...

We long for your peace that passes all understanding, Faithful God, as we anxiously watch the news from **Afghanistan**, as countries take in refugees fleeing the country after Taliban militants took power, as countries evacuate their diplomats, as countries withdraw their military forces...

Yet, even as overwhelming as the news can be, if we are looking for the spark of hope, we can find it: couples who struggled with infertility are celebrating the birth of their children, partners are celebrating weddings and anniversaries, students and teachers are beginning a new school year in parts of the world, there are new and exciting job opportunities, adventures, homes, and relationships...

LUTHERAN DISASTER RESPONSE **ELCA-** Haiti Earthquake

"I call upon you, for you will answer me, O God; incline your ear to me, hear my words" (Psalm 17:6).

Friends.

A devastating 7.2 magnitude earthquake struck southwest Haiti on Saturday morning. Over 1,400 people were killed, and that number is expected to increase as search-and-rescue efforts continue. Blocked roads are delaying the delivery of vital supplies to hospitals, which are overwhelmed with more than 6,900 injured people.

At least 26,000 homes were damaged or destroyed, but the full extent of damage is still unknown. Haiti is also suffering through a political crisis and was hit by Tropical Storm Grace on Monday night, which caused severe flooding in communities already damWe'll need the following:

- casserole 4 cooks (making 2 pans each)
- 120 rolls
- vegetables to serve 120
- dessert cookies or brownies, etc. for 120 (storebought or homemade)

Chaplains Dinner is a mission of 'Chaplains on the Harbor' and feeds anyone that is hungry (housed or unhoused) each Sunday afternoon out of our church kitchen. Currently all meals are 'to-go.' Following the September meal our next date to provide food is November 21.

aged by the earthquake.

For over two decades, the ELCA has maintained a presence in southern Haiti through support for agricultural and sustainable development work. To continue our engagement with those communities, Lutheran Disaster Response is collaborating with partner organizations in the communities to meet relief needs, including food, water, medical supplies and temporary shelter.

In the future, other areas of support will include psychosocial care, water and sanitation, and creating sustainable livelihoods through agriculture and livestock. We also stand with the Evangelical Lutheran Church in Haiti as it assesses damage and impacts on churches and church life.

WE NEED HEALTHY COMMUNICATION MORE THAN EVER!!!

Healthy communication is important in the best of times. Throw in a pandemic and political turmoil and things can get messy. In the church we are especially careful to express our love for each other and for all our neighbors by practicing healthy communication skills. Some basics that are helpful in all relationships include the following.

- Everyone speaks for themselves. Each of us needs to take responsibility for expressing our own feelings or concerns.
- When there is a concern, we go directly to the person involved. Honest, direct, loving commu
- nication is the basis of all healthy relationships.

- If the concern is not resolved after direct communication, we ask a neutral person to join us in that conversation for the sake of understanding and healing.
- We avoid triangulation. Triangulation occurs when one person does not communicate directly with another person, instead using a third person to relay communication to the second. Triangulation distorts relationships and makes clear communication difficult.
- We pray for each other trusting that God loves us all and in prayer can heal our hurts and restore relationships.

Vision: A welcoming place where grace happens.

Mission: To Experience and share God's love through worship, education, and community.


