The founder of Just Faith Ministry, Jack Jezreel says, "One of the most fundamental insights of the Gospel, reinforced by the experience of human beings all over the planet, is that the fully human, fully alive person is someone who loves wide. To be whole, says Jesus, is to care not only about the most immediate relationships—family and friends, for example—but to love beyond those with the same last name, same zip code, same flag, or same skin color. Wisdom and holiness, says our faith tradition, is discovered in an active love that embraces all, especially those who have been exploited, impoverished, and aban-

doned. God's love and God's world were meant to be shared by all!"

We know that. We hear that every week in the Gospel and then we walk out of the doors of the sanctuary and we see the need all around us. It is so easy to become overwhelmed and even complacent. It seems so difficult to answer Jesus' call to love our neighbors suffering poverty, homelessness, or addiction!

How can we live more fully into the wholeness and fully aliveness that Jesus promises as abundant life with him? That is the question that Just Faith program seeks to answer. We begin by grappling with what is meant by "justice" in the Bible and how it relates to our world today. We begin by becoming vulnerable, looking at ourselves and our culture and asking hard questions of ourselves about our relationship with the culture. We begin by becoming vulnerable to God through prayer, journaling, and sharing our experiences with others.

Jezreel says, "In many ways, JFM is an **invitation to wrestle with Matthew 25** ("Whatever you do to the least, you do to me"), surrounded by

fellow travelers, a commitment to prayer, compelling learning tools, and opportunities to form relationships with sisters and brothers whose lives have known struggle and suffering." As we explore the gospel together and what it means in OUR world, we grow closer to one another and to the people we are called to consider our family, the poor, vulnerable and wounded. As we follow Jesus, we are filled with hope and new possibilities and this compassion changes the world. "Those who need food are fed. Those who need community find friends. Those who need homes are housed. Those who need inspiration are renewed. Those who have been self-preoccupied are freed. Those who have walked in darkness find light."

In the next few days, set aside some time to pray about where God is calling YOU NOW! ## Stay Awake: The Days are Surely Coming YOUR INVITATION TO HELP CREATE THE Amazing Grace Advent 2021 Devotional

<sup>31</sup> The days are surely coming, says the LORD, when I will make a new covenant with the house of Israel and the house of Judah. ... I will put my law within them, and I will write it on their hearts; and I will be their God, and they shall be my people. No longer shall they teach one another, or say to each other, "Know the LORD," for they shall all know me, from the least of them to the greatest, says the LORD; for I will forgive their iniquity, and remember their sin no more. Jeremiah 31: 31, 34



**Stay Awake: The Days are Surely Coming** when God's hope, justice, love, and joy (in other words, God's kin-dom) will be ours, now and into eternity.

In the season of Advent and into the Christmas season until the day of the Epiphany of our Lord, we are invited to "Stay Awake", to pay attention to the ways that God is calling us, giving us hope, strengthening our resolve, empowering us for the work of radical kin-ship in our broken world. **Unlike the rest of the culture, the church takes a whole season,** Advent through the day of Epiphany to be immersed in the truth that GOD IS WITH US – EMMANUEL creating that kin-dom that will one day be perfected!

To help us see glimpses of that promise more clearly, we are going to reflect on the readings for the season **together!** You are invited to **choose one day's reading (or more) to consider and share that with your family at Amazing Grace**. You may choose to focus on one verse, or a phrase or the whole passage. It can be something the passage makes you think of, or feel, or imagine. Your reflection could even be a question the reading Praises for you. Be yourself! Be REAL! We are ALL theologians (those who think about God and our relationship with God) so we all have something to share. Your perspective may be just the touch someone else needs to feel God's presence in a new way!

# You can work with someone else if you want to and of course, children are invited to contribute! Use your imagination! You may want to include a short prayer, picture, or poem if they add to the message you want to convey or that might be the whole devotion.

The readings can be found in your own Bible, or you may borrow a Bible from church, or you can find them online at Biblegateway.com (Enter the passage name, book, and chapter, then use the dropdown triangle at the right to choose the version you want to read. The one we usually use in worship is NRSV, New Revised Standard Version.)

Your reflection, along with the date and verse you've chosen, and your name are due into the church office by **November 15<sup>th</sup>** so that we'll have time to assemble the reflections and make them available to everyone well before the first day of Advent, Nov. 28<sup>th</sup>. #### God's work. Our hands.

There was once a time when two distinct peoples were trying to comprehend how they could be one people. One was a millennia-old people who had persevered through enslavement, oppression and exile. And they still preserved their identity and trust in God. They believed that God had blessed them to be a blessing to all humanity even when the rest of humanity reacted violently against them. They believed that God had made an everlasting covenant with them and had given them a sign of that promise.

The other people were hostile, polytheistic, the majority and suspicious of the other. They rejected any claims by the other group that a life lived by covenant obligations could possibly be a good one. This wasn't just a lack of understanding, but antagonism and contempt.

Then, something happened. Through the cross these two peoples became one people. This is the story of the first-century church. "But now in Christ Jesus you who were once far off have been brought near by the blood of Christ. For he is our peace; in his flesh he has made both groups into one and has broken down the dividing wall, that is, the hostility between us" (Ephesians 2:13-14).

I think it's difficult for 21st-century Christians to comprehend the seismic shift that had occurred. The very first Christians were Jews. They didn't see themselves apart from the covenant God had made with God's people. The Torah wasn't an arbitrary collection of burdensome requirements. It was the living voice of the God of Abraham, Isaac and Jacob in their midst and throughout their lives. The circumcision of males was a sign of that covenant, a sign instituted by God and communicated to the people by Moses. Jesus was circumcised. Paul was circumcised. The male disciples were circumcised.

But what to do about the uncircumcised gentiles? How could they possibly be considered part of the covenant? **They were "other," literally beyond the pale.** "So then, remember that at one time you Gentiles by birth, called 'the uncircumcision' by those who are called 'the circumcision' ... remember that you were at that time without Christ, being aliens from the commonwealth of Israel, and strangers to the covenants of promise, having no hope and without God in the world" (Ephesians 2:11-12).

This was a critical moment for the early church. Paul and others had witnessed the Spirit at work among the gentiles, who weren't circumcised and, therefore, weren't considered to be heirs of the covenant. The dispute between the two groups was heated. It went to the very core of what it meant to be part of the church. Peter and Paul weren't of one mind. Could these competing understandings of God's work in the community be reconciled?

This was brought to the apostles and elders in Jerusalem. They took counsel from Scripture, tradition and the report of the outpouring of the Spirit. They then sent this decision to the gentiles: "For it has seemed good to the Holy Spirit and to us to impose on you no further burden than these essentials: that you abstain from what has been sacrificed to idols and from blood and from what is strangled and from fornication. If you keep yourselves from these, you will do well" (Acts 15:28-29). They were "no longer strangers and aliens," but "citizens with the saints and also members of the household of God" (Ephesians 2:19).

They were one body. We are one body. We are the body of Christ. We are members one of another and knit together by and in Christ. Yes, we have significant disagreement about very important issues, but our cultural and political differences cannot dissolve this bond.

We can take heart from the example of the early church. If, by the Spirit's power, they could set aside their differences—which were far greater than any of ours—then we, too, by the power of the Spirit, can live into the unity that already exists in Christ.

#### WE NEED HEALTHY COMMUNICATION MORE THAN EVER!!!

Healthy communication is important in the best of times. Throw in a pandemic and political turmoil and things can get messy. In the church we are especially careful to express our love for each other and for all our neighbors by practicing healthy communication skills. Some basics that are helpful in all relationships include the following.

- Everyone speaks for themselves. Each of us needs to take responsibility for expressing our own feelings or concerns.
- When there is a concern, we go directly to the person involved. Honest, direct, loving communication is the basis of all healthy relationships.
- If the concern is not resolved after direct communication, we ask a neutral person to join us in that conversation for the sake of understanding and healing.
- We avoid triangulation. Triangulation occurs when one person does not communicate directly with another person, instead using a third person to relay communication to the second. Triangulation distorts relationships and makes clear communication difficult.
- We pray for each other trusting that God loves us all and in prayer can heal our hurts and restore relationships.
