It's autumn, even here in our green world with leaves changing, rainy days more often than not, a chill in the air. So much is dying and yet so much is beautiful. There is change. There is a hint of decay and yet the illusive glimpse of something shimmering, beckons around the corner.

This is life in this holy creation. This is the gospel good news. While there is death, there is, hand-in-hand promise of resurrection. There is loss and there is promise of hope. There is sadness and there is promise of joy.

The proper stance in this creation is one of thanks but only after lament. There is much for which to give God thanks and there is much to lament. Both are faithful. Both are appropriate. True and profound thankfulness follows an honest naming of all that has been lost, the pain suffered, the hope diminished. Honestly naming our pain and loss, leaving the burden of that at the cross and in the care of our gracious and mighty God, frees us to receive what is good and beautiful and true and to give thanks for all that remains and all that is promised.

As we ease into November, we begin with All Saints Sunday, Nov. 7th. During our All Saints service this year we will not only name our loved ones who have died, those we carry in our hearts. We will also name the other losses we've experienced during Covid: time with friends, anticipated events, the image of who we thought we were (individually and as a nation) that has been stripped away by this pandemic, by the racial reckoning

we're experiencing, by the glaring reality of inequality of all kinds.

Lament is not unfaithful. It is not pessimism. It is not hopelessness. It is facing the reality of what it means to be mortal in a finite world. It is the beginning of real hope based in the reality of being a part of God's beautiful creation. When we deny our losses our joy is diminished. Only those who know all that they have lost are thankful for every moment.

We often console those we love by sending them flowers or planting a tree in memory of their dear one. As a way to move our lament into hope for us all, let us offer gifts to those who have so little that hope is hard to muster. Bring whatever you think

would be a gift of hope for those living in desperation: those without a home, those without a job, those living on the brink. We'll distribute your gifts in the following week through the Chehalis Mutual Aid Network, the Aberdeen Food Bank, or other groups if your gift is more appropriately distributed in another way. So, on All Saints Sunday, Nov. 7th bring food, bring coats, sleeping bags, socks, gloves, whatever holds your sadness at what has been lost and can be a sign of hope for someone else now.

Amazing Grace Advent 2021 Devotional Stay Awake: The Days are Surely Coming

In the season of Advent and into the Christmas season until the day of the Epiphany of our Lord, we are invited to "Stay Awake", to pay attention to the ways that God is calling us, giving us hope, strengthening our resolve.



You are invited to choose one day's reading (or more) to consid-

er and share that with your family at Amazing Grace. You may choose to focus on one verse, or a phrase or the whole passage. It can be something the passage makes you think of, or feel, or imagine. Your reflection could even be a question the reading raises for you. Be yourself! Be REAL! We are ALL theologians (those who think about God and our relationship with God), so we all have something to share. Your perspective may be just the touch someone else needs to feel God's presence in a new way!

You can work with someone else if you want to and of course, children are invited to contribute! Use your imagination! You may want to include a short prayer, picture, or poem if they add to the message you want to convey or that might be the whole devotion.

Your reflection, along with the date and verse you've chosen, and your name are due into the church office by **November 15th** so that we'll have time to assemble the reflections and make them available to everyone well before the first day of Advent, Nov. 28th. **You will find the calendar of readings on pages 8-9** in this newsletter, attached to Grace Notes and on the website: amazinggraceaberdeen.org



There are very few times in my life when I experience silence. There is the ever-present ambient noise of the city or the office: traffic, planes, power mowers, power tools, the intrusive

alerts from computers signaling new emails or texts, ringtones. I find myself obsessively plugged in to the news, Twitter and YouTube—all available all the time, portable and near at hand on my cell-

phone.

And then there is the **noise in my head**: racing thoughts, internal conversations, grocery lists, music. Even—or perhaps especially—when the world around me is mostly still, I notice that I am not.

I'm not sure what drives this acoustic and mental busyness, but I know I'm not the only one who so seldom experiences silence. Maybe we are just trying to get more stuff done. Maybe it's FOMO—fear of missing out. Maybe it's habit.

I do know that this constant noise and stimulation can be exhausting and stressful. The more noise, the louder we become in order to be heard, which leads to more noise.

In recent weeks we have been overwhelmed by disasters, natural and human-made. The West Coast is burning, and the Gulf Coast and East Coast are drowning. The elected Afghan government has fallen, and that 20-year war has come to an end. We are still stuck in this pandemic. We worry about our children who are too young to get vaccinated. We worry about our elders with comorbidities. We worry about ourselves.

In an effort to make sense of all this, we seek to gather more information and more data, which we hope will give us answers or show us a way out. There is no shortage of voices. We are bombarded with experts and pundits analyzing everything, talking and talking and talking. **STOP.**

The prophet Elijah had a profound experience of silence. He was fleeing for his life from the wrath of Jezebel. I imagine the stress was generating a lot of internal noise. But the word of the Lord came to Elijah and said, "Go out and stand on the mountain before the Lord, for the Lord is about to pass by" (1 Kings 19:11).

And then we read: "Now there was a great wind, so

strong that it was splitting mountains and breaking rocks in pieces before the Lord, but the Lord was not in the wind; and after the wind an earthquake, but the Lord was not in the earthquake; and after the earthquake a fire, but the Lord was not in the fire; and after the fire a sound of sheer silence" (11-12).

Wind and earthquakes and fire all seem reasonable when God makes an entrance. There are many instances in Scripture when God is announced in sound and pyrotechnics. But this story from 1 Kings has always caught my attention. The phrase in verse 12 is often translated as the sound of "a still, small voice." Yet it wasn't the sound of a voice that indicated that God was present. It was the sound of sheer silence. "When Elijah heard it, he wrapped his face in his mantle and stood at the entrance of the cave" (13).

Silence.

Spending time in silence is a spiritual discipline. My spiritual director urges me to spend 20 minutes in silence every day. I can do about five. Silence is not a technique but a way of being in God's presence. It's pretty simple, but it's not easy. Sheer silence silences us—all of our defenses and self-justifications. It can be terrifying because in silence there is nothing between the soul and its source of being. No wonder that Elijah, when he heard the sound of sheer silence, wrapped his face in his mantle. He was in the presence of the Holy.

We are invited into silence. In the words of the hymn: "Let all mortal flesh keep silence, and with fear and trembling stand; ponder nothing earthly minded, for with blessing in his hand Christ our God to earth descending comes full homage to demand" (Evangelical Lutheran Worship, 490).





Dear Family and Friends,

I would like to increase my monthly support by \$600 per month. My goal before I left for Myanmar in September 2019 was \$1,500 per month. Thanks to so many of you who faithfully gave every month I had an average of \$1,400 in support each and every month! I also had some surprise gifts that really

helped along the way! I am so thankful for God's provision through your partnership in ministry!!

There are a number of reasons I am increasing my monthly support.

1) There have been increases in the cost of living in Myanmar and increases in the cost of travel worldwide.

- 2) I will need to rent my own living space when I return to Myanmar instead of living in the YWAM (Youth With a Mission) dorm.
- 3) I feel I need to spend more on food when I return. I typically lose 10 to 20 pounds when I'm in Myanmar because of diet. I can survive without more expensive foreign goodies like cheese, butter, milk, etc...but after so many years of eating only local food (rice 3 times a day with a meat dish and fried vegetables) I know that I cannot thrive on a 100% Myanmar diet. I tried...but I need goodies like dairy products to keep a healthy weight. 4) I have also chosen to use \$200 of my monthly support to help support local staff. I work with many locals who live on less than \$80 a month. After giving \$8 for tithes and spending around \$50 on food for the month it leaves them with only \$22 to get them through the month to buy toiletries, ride the bus, pay phone bills, etc. Helping the staff I work with to thrive in ministry is something God has put on my heart to do.

The third thing I am preparing for when I return to Myanmar is to purchase a vehicle. When I return to Myanmar I will be joining a team in a city called Mawlamyine. This city does not have a bus system or taxis, which is how I have been able to live 16 years in Yangon without my own vehicle. There are motorcycle taxis in Mawlamyine and I actually don't mind using them. However, using motorcycles for carrying things when shopping or during rainy season is not practical. It also isn't very safe to be riding motorcycles with strangers without a

helmet on a regular basis.

The main reason I have not had a vehicle for so long is because of the high cost. A used vehicle, 10 years old or older, will easily cost \$30,000. This is because of the high import taxes that the Myanmar government charges. I would like to get a vehicle that is reliable to drive so I'm hoping to get something around 10 years old. Praise God, I already have \$10,000 of the \$30,000 that I am raising. I am looking at getting a Toyota pickup because of its versatility for hauling things or seating a lot of people. In Myanmar they put bench seats in the back and a canopy on top so a pickup can easily seat 15 or more people. I plan to make this vehicle available for the team in Mawlamyine to use for ministry purposes and so seating a lot of people or hauling supplies is important. Toyota, by far, is the most practical in Myanmar because it is the most common and easy to get worked on anywhere throughout the country instead of being limited to getting serviced at showrooms in Yangon for other less common types of cars.

As I close, I would like to encourage you to pray and see if God shows you a way that He may want to use you to help provide for these needs.

Thank you for taking the time to read this and for being a part of what God is doing in my life and ministry through your prayers and support!



WE NEED HEALTHY COMMUNICATION MORE THAN EVER!!!

Healthy communication is important in the best of times. Throw in a pandemic and political turmoil and things can get messy. In the church we are especially careful to express our love for each other and for all our neighbors by practicing healthy commu nication skills. Some basics that are helpful in all relationships include the following.

- Everyone speaks for themselves. Each of us needs to take responsibility for expressing our own feelings or concerns.
- When there is a concern, we go directly to the person involved. Honest, direct, loving communication is the basis of all healthy rela-

tionships.

- If the concern is not resolved after direct communication, we ask a neutral person to join us in that conversation for the sake of understanding and healing.
- We avoid triangulation. Triangulation occurs when one person does not communicate directly
- with another person, instead using a third person to relay communication to the second. Triangulation distorts relationships and makes clear communication difficult.
- We pray for each other trusting that God loves us all and in prayer can heal our hurts and restore relationships.


