If you can't beat 'em, join 'em! Right?

The frenzy is upon us. It's late October and Christmas décor has been in stores for weeks. The pendulum may have begun to swing back as some big retailers announce that they will be closed on Thanksgiving, ALL of Thanksgiving Day. Some are even proudly proclaiming they'll be closed the day AFTER Thanksgiving as well, while true pioneer retail spirits are paying their employees for those store closure days. We may be growing tired of the consumer lifestyle. Or retailers



are beginning to see less financial return for all that frenzy. Whatever the cause, fewer shopping opportunities may offer a little breathing space for those weary of the shopping life. That in itself is a blessing. But, for now the Christmas loot is available earlier than ever this year.

So, if you can't beat 'em, join 'em! Not in the frenzy, of course! Who needs more frenzy in their lives?! Let's join 'em in being prepared, getting a jump start on the season of peace and hope. Let's prepare our hearts to recognize and embrace the words of truth: "Unto YOU is born a savior who is Christ the Lord." The Eastern Orthodox Church and Celtic Christian tradition have long observed 40 days of Advent similar to Lent's 40 days. It's in the Biblical tradition of 40 days as time set apart to be formed and prepared for a new way of being: 40 days of wilderness wandering for the Hebrews fleeing Egypt or 40 day of temptation for the newly baptized Jesus.

40 days gives us an extra 10 days of preparation so that we're prepared to be prepared. It gives us a jump start of intention focusing our attention on what matters so that the four weeks before Christmas we can be formed into people of peace and hope, love and joy - the fabric of Christmas. We are so easily distracted by shiny things, simple things when our hearts were made for the complexity of JOY, the vastness of HOPE.

This year let us keep a true Advent season by preparing our hearts in the rhythms of beauty and hope so that when the first Sunday of Advent arrives we will have already begun to have new eyes to see, and ears to hear the truth of Emmanuel, God With Us. Celtic Advent begins Nov. 15th. On that Sunday I will have a calendar for each of you, with one simple idea per day that can guide your 40 day pilgrimage into God's heart. As Susan Forshey, who designed the 40 day Advent Calendar says, "The ability to give and experience love and joy doesn't just happen, it needs to be stretched and strengthened. And over time, the capacity to love and to joy increases. Let the Holy Spirit lead!"

In the meantime, savor each day and each holiday: Halloween, safely frightful, deliciously scary when so much in our world is terrifyingly out of our control. Savor Thanksgiving, time to remember that we are the source of very little that we enjoy in this life. It all comes to us as gift from previous generations, those who have loved and nurtured us; from God. Then, in its own time, Christmas will give us what we have prepared to receive.

You are precious in God's sight and in mine!

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ALTAR NEWS by Diane Hanson

PART ONE: Famous Woman Altar Painter: Sara (h)Kirkeberg Raugland was the only well-known woman altar painting artist of her time. Sara (h) was born in 1862 in Elgin, Iowa and died in 1960 at the age of 98. She married Norwegian immigrant Carl Raugland, who sold church organs.

Today many of Sara's altar paintings have disappeared but Amazing Grace is fortunate to have one of her altar paintings signed by her and dated 1906. This makes our painting almost 110 years old and the only one located in the state of Washington.

She studied and set up a studio in Minneapolis and was able to make a living by painting altar center pieces. It is estimated that Raugland painted approximately 300 altar paintings in her life, and that her works are in churches around the United States as well as in Norway. Altar paintings were a common feature of Scandinavia Lutheran churches built before the turn of the 20th century.

I have been in contact with Sara Raugland's great-great niece, Elaine Ask of Chatfield, Minnesota. Elaine has done extensive research and has located about 90 of her great-great aunt's altar paintings.

PART TWO-CONTINUED FROM OCTOBER SPIRIT: Elaine and her husband, Peter, came to Aberdeen on October 2nd to view and photograph the altar painting. Members of the alar guild and Liturgical Arts Team enjoyed a luncheon and conversation regarding the history of the artist with Elaine and Peter. We already have donations coming in to clean the 110 year old painting in time for the 500th Reformation celebration.




LETTER FROM PRESIDING BISHOP ELIZABETH EATON

What is 'Lutheran'? We have a particular way of understanding the Jesus story By Presiding Bishop Elizabeth Eaton

For the past two years, I've organized my work around these four emphases: we are church, we are Lutheran, we are church together and we are church for the sake of the world.

I want to spend a little time thinking with you about what is means to be Lutheran in the 21st century. What do we mean when we say we are Lutheran? The 500th anniversary of




Maybe a good place to start is to ask why it's important and helpful to have a Lutheran identity. Some would say that denominations and denominational loyalty are things of the past. There is some truth to this, especially if our denomination is defined by ethnicity and culture and our loyalty is primarily to the denomination and not to our Lord.

There was a campaign during the 1980's church growth movement to get rid of any denominational markers whatsoever. The stolid St. Paul Lutheran Church on the corner was supposed to be renamed something like "The Church at Pheasant Run." How evocative! How cool! How vaguely woodsy! A simple name change would accomplish two things at once: stop scaring the denominationally averse away and attract tons of people. It didn't.

In an attempt to become more attractive we became generic. Having a clear sense of who we are and what we believe isn't a detriment but an asset. If we are well-defined and well-differentiated, we are more able to engage in ecumenical and interreligious dialogue and can be a clear voice in the public square.

But what is "Lutheran"? We chuckle at author Garrison Keillor's loving caricature of Lutherans. He does describe many of us, but not all of us. I would never disavow the western and northern European heritage of thousands of our people. It's part of our story. But we also have thousands of sisters and brothers of African, Asian, Latino/Latina, Native American, and Arab and Middle Eastern desgent, some of whom have been Lutheran for generations.

And the Lutheran church is experiencing its greatest growth in the "global south" (Africa, Central and Latin America, and most of Asia). There are more Lutherans in Indonesia than in the ELCA. There are more Lutherans in Ethiopia and Tanzania than in the U.S. There are Lutherans in El Salvador and Japan and India and Mexico and Palestine and Jordan and China and Ireland. The newest Lutheran church is being formed in the world's newest country. We are working with Sudanese Lutheran pastors to establish a

Lutheran church in South Sudan.

Jell-O doesn't routinely show up at the potlucks of these Lutherans. Being Lutheran is not fundamentally about ethnicity. If culture and cuisine don't define us, our theology must. Lutherans have a very particular way of understanding the Jesus story. It's not a movement from unbridled freedom to submission. Rather, it's the story of God redeeming us from sin, death and the devil, setting us free from our bondage to sin so that, liberated and alive, we may serve God by serving the neighbor. And it's not about our effort or goodness or hard work. It's about God's gracious will to be merciful.

Try this at home: ask family or friends what they must do to be in a right relationship with God. After picking their jaws up off the floor that they were asked such a question, my guess is that people will talk about keeping the commandments, being a better person, reading the Bible more. No. The love of God at work in the crucified Christ creates this right relationship. Our part is to receive this gift in faith.

This is a shattering reversal of the way things have always worked. We don't have a transactional relationship with God — if I do this then God will do that. It is a transformational relationship. We who were dead in sin have now been made alive. We are free to respond to that deep abiding love. What we eat, what hymns we sing, what jokes we tell, what counties we hail from, what color we are, what we wear — none of this binds us together or makes us Lutheran. It is God's grace. And that is good news in any language.


