because, well, because in this world; this **particular** world in which we live **today** we need courage. We need courage to hope; courage to joyfully; courage to love. In a time when terrorists wreak havoc in the City of Light; when

climate change threatens to displace 150 million people, WE NEED

COURAGE to speak of the hope we have in Christ with integrity. As of today

12/2, the 336th day of 2015, there have been 355 mass shootings in the U.S. That's more than one per day. (Mass shootings means 4+ victims including the shooter. Yeah, we have to define mass shootings now. Wouldn't want to claim a mass shooting when it's ONLY 3 people!!!) The world doesn't need platitudes or blind optimism. **The world needs Truth that speaks to the deep pain and longing of our time.** We truly need courage to face the truth and to speak the truth and so we pray the Advent Credo and ask the Holy Spirit to make it so in our lives.



### Advent Credo

It is not true that creation and the human family are doomed to destruction and loss—

This is true: For God so loved the world that He gave his only begotten Son, that whoever believes in Him shall not perish but have everlasting life;

It is not true that we must accept inhumanity and discrimination, hunger and poverty, death and destruction—

This is true: I have come that they may have life, and that abundantly.

It is not true that violence and hatred should have the last word, and that war and destruction rule forever—

This is true: Unto us a child is born, unto us a Son is given, and the government shall be upon his shoulder, his name shall be called wonderful councilor, mighty God, the Everlasting, the Prince of peace.

It is not true that we are simply victims of the powers of evil who seek to rule the world—

This is true: To me is given authority in heaven and on earth, and lo I am with you, even until the end of the world.

It is not true that we have to wait for those who are specially gifted, who are the prophets of the Church before we can be peacemakers—

This is true: I will pour out my spirit on all flesh and your sons and daughters shall prophesy, your young men shall see visions and your old men shall have dreams.

It is not true that our hopes for liberation of humankind, of justice, of human dignity of peace are not meant for this earth and for this history—

This is true: The hour comes, and it is now, that the true worshipers shall worship God in spirit and in truth.

So let us enter Advent in hope, even hope against hope. Let us see visions of love and peace and justice. Let us affirm with humility, with joy, with faith, with courage: Jesus Christ—the life of the world.

### LETTER FROM PRESIDING BISHOP ELIZABETH EATON

#### The unsettled season of Advent

In incarnate Christ, God finds us and gives restless hearts rest By Elizabeth A. Eaton O come, O come Emmanuel, and ransom captive Israel, that mourns in lonely exile here until the Son of God appear (Evangelical Lutheran Worship, 257).

Advent. We were just here it seems. It's a season of preparation and anticipation. It can become exhausting and relentless. The commercial run-up to Christmas has certainly gotten longer. Sometime right

after Labor Day the holiday displays appear in stores, ads pop up on our laptops and hand-held electronic devices, and carols creep into Muzak. And the annual holiday worship war between pastors and people will be waged over whether to sing Christmas carols in church during Advent.

I will not weigh in on that epic debate in this column. Instead, I want us to consider the deep and holy longing that is part of this season. It is significant that the words of the prophets and the yearning of Israel in exile are so prominent in the lessons appointed for Advent. The people longed for the Lord to come, to act, to redeem them, to take them home. Their exile in Babylon was no longer harsh. Many had made good lives, raised children and settled in. But it wasn't quite right. They were physically present in Babylon, but their hearts were not there.

I think Advent is that way for us. The earth is God's good creation. We find much joy in this life. As Lutherans we do not withdraw from the world but engage it, believing that it is a gift.

But we also know that it is not quite right. That there is brokenness and pain—the pain we experience, the pain others cause, the pain we cause others. And, because of our brokenness, we turn in on ourselves trying, in futile self-sufficiency, to make ourselves whole. In some ways Advent creates a certain restlessness. It may be one of the few seasons of the year when we become more aware of our

longing for wholeness and more alert to the signs that something is approaching. It's like hearing a sound in the distance that heralds something, but we just can't quite make it out. I believe Advent is a liminal time, a threshold. The Celts called this a "thin place," a place and time where heaven and earth seem to touch. It's just there, just out of sight, just out of reach. And we are filled with a holy longing. Isaiah said it: "O that you would tear open the heavens and come down …" (Isaiah 64:1).



What is it about us that makes us care, that makes us restless? Isaiah also wrote: "Yet, O Lord, you are our Father, we are the clay, and you are our potter; we are all the work of your hand" (Isaiah 64:8). It seems that this Advent longing is an awareness that apart from God we are not whole. In Advent we find ourselves in the unsettled and restless time between the ending of the old year and the beginning of the new, a thin place where we draw near to God realizing, as Augustine wrote, "You have formed us for yourself, and our hearts are restless till they find their rest in you" (Confessions).

But we can't get there by ourselves. This is not our work, but God's. Trustful waiting for the Lord is the purpose of Advent: waiting, yearning, expecting, believing. And God is faithful. We hear from the prophet Zephaniah that God promises: "At that time I will bring you home, at the time when I gather you ..." (Zephaniah 3:20).

But the One for whom we wait is not content merely to draw us in, but fulfills this promise by coming to us as Emmanuel, God with us. In the incarnate Christ, God comes to us, finds us and gives our restless hearts rest.

A friend of mine said, "The world is longing for a deeper sense of spiritual connection, but we haven't figured out how to meet the world in that conversation and longing. How can Advent be the start of that new conversation? How different would Advent look if we could start to think of that deep longing as part of our Advent journey?"

Being unsettled in this season might be good for us. God will not disappoint.



# **Council's Corner**

At the end of this year, the council will have 3 openings; Treasurer, Property, Youth & Family. Amy Ostwald has agreed to serve on the council, starting next year, leading the Youth & Family committee.

We are still looking for a volunteer to lead the Property committee, so please give prayerful consideration to whether this is where God is calling you to serve at AGLC. Council members lead the work of the church according to our mission statement and values, calling on the people of the church to use their gifts for the sake of God's work at AGLC.

At a council retreat, we studied a book that recommended a council have no more than 6 members (not including the pastor), for a church the size of Amazing Grace. We had 9 members at that time, and this year we shrank the council to 8 members.

In trying to recruit people to serve on council for the coming year, I realize there is a limited pool of members of the congregation able to serve. The council needs to continue to change its structure to better match the abilities and time commitments of our congregation. That is why the council is exploring different ways of conducting the business of the church.

This last year, the council started this change process by having the Church Administrative assistant take notes at council. This eliminated the secretary position on council.

Chrissie Kincaid is stepping down from the treasurer position at the end of this year. Chrissie has been a blessing to us with her skills and insight, it is just a lot of work to ask a volunteer to step into. The council will vote at the December Council meeting on replacing the council position with a paid treasurer, who will report to the Financial Secretary on council.

For the Vice President position, Diane has been kind enough to pull double duty, leading the worship committee and being vice president. This has not been fair to Diane and has not allowed her follow her passion on the worship committee. So Diane is stepping down from the Vice President position. For next year, we are considering having the vice president position rotate through the other members of council each month, allowing them to meet as part of the Executive committee.

Obviously all of this is outside our current constitution and bylaws, which will require that they be rewritten and submitted to the congregation for approval.
