


In this season of Epiphany, the season of what is hidden being revealed, we hear in Scripture that the Magi are told in a dream to "Depart by a different route." The old way home was full of danger and deceit, lies and manipulative maneuvering and so they were advised to find a new way to their home, a new way that reflected their new understanding of truth and of God being revealed not in the ways of deceit or manipulation, but in the exquisite vulnerability of a baby. That exquisite vulnerability is God for you, they discovered. That is God for all humanity: vulnerable with us, and for us.

That is God and that is who God calls us to be in this world with each other: vulnerable, trusting, hopeful and as Father Greg Boyle describes the life of those who follow Jesus, living with the same "extravagant tenderness" with which Jesus lived because that way of life expresses who God is to a world desperate for tenderness and truth.

As Boyle says, "If we're honest, the world kind of yawns at "religion," but snaps to attention when offered the authenticity and authority of the fluent, mystical, nondualist view. We want to both hear and speak this whole language [the whole story of Gods extravagant tenderness], because, mostly, we only know the half of it. We get stuck in a partial view.

This mystical kinship, this speaking the whole language is the exact opposite of the age in which we currently live: tribal, divisive, suspicious, anchored in the illusion of separation — unhealthy, sad, fearful, other-izing, and demonizing. Mystics [those who seek God, not an institution] replace fear with love, vindictiveness with openhearted kindness, envy with supportive affection, withering judgment with extra



tenderness. Now is the time, as author Brian Doyle suggests, to embrace 'something other than combat.'''¹

Let us all, the mystics of Amazing Grace, the followers of Jesus who shows us this tenderness of God, "Depart by a different route." With eyes wide open to division, suspicion and embrace of the illusion of separation, we choose to follow Jesus into those places most desperately in need of hope, knowing that is the only place we will encounter Jesus.

As we go, we pray together the prayer with which we ended the 2022 Amazing Grace annual meeting:

O God, you have called your servants to ventures of which we cannot see the ending, by paths as yet untrodden, through perils unknown. Give us faith to go out with good courage, not knowing where we go, but only that your hand is leading us and your love supporting us; through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen.

WHAT MASKS DO WE ALL WEAR?

Getting ready to leave the house—for work or errands—takes a couple extra steps during a pandemic. Do I know how crowded my destination will be? Did I remember to take a mask? Of all the annoying things about this pandemic, I find remembering to take and to wear a mask is one of the most irksome. Masks aren't comfortable, they make it more difficult to understand conversations, and they are a daily reminder that we are not out of the woods yet.

Let me be clear—masks are an effective way to stop the spread of this terrible virus, and I will wear one for as long as it takes. I urge all of us to do the same. This isn't about personal choice, but it is a physical manifestation that in baptism "we, who are many, are one body in Christ, and individually we are members one of another" (Romans 12:5). Wearing a mask is as much for our protection as it is for protecting others. I will continue to mask up.

I always thought it was silly that bandits and robbers are depicted wearing only a mask from just below the eyes down. How could that possibly be a disguise? One's eyes, hair and ears are all visible. You can hear the voice. You can figure out a person's stature. What's the point?

It turns out that sighted people get an enormous number of nonverbal cues from someone's face. Infants can read faces even before their eyesight is fully developed. An amazing amount of communication is possible even when interacting with someone who speaks a different language.

I don't think I'm unique in this, but I mentally fill in what a person looks like behind the mask. I make determinations about a person's age and disposition, not to mention physical characteristics. When I do see someone's unmasked face, it turns out that I am always wrong. This could be as benign as not imagining a person had a moustache to more significant assumptions about the person's character.

I mask people even when they aren't wearing an actual mask. This person is white, or this person is young, or this person is Black, or this person is Asian/Pacific Islander, or this person is Arab/

Middle Eastern, or this person is Latinx, or this person is old, or this person is a farmer, or this person is urban, or this person is Lutheran. You can fill out the list. I ascribe characteristics to all of these people without really seeing them.

And then, I wonder about the masks I wear. Wife, daughter, mother, sister. Pastor, friend, the PRE-SIDING BISHOP (yikes!). When interactions are fraught, the staff have identified what they call my "Queen Face."

What masks do we all wear? Some are appropriate—we don't have to emote all over everyone all the time. It's good to have boundaries—some are needed for safety. But none of these is who we truly are, and all of these take energy.

As we have been returning to in-person worship and once again celebrating communion, I've witnessed a beautiful phenomenon. When people come forward to receive the host, they momentarily remove their masks. One by one, in the face of our Lord's body, they reveal themselves and are revealed. Their faces appear. No mask. No covering. No defense. No need for defense. For that instant they no longer carry the burden of wearing the mask of their demographic, heritage or ethnicity. They are no longer called upon to be stoic.

At that moment they realize on earth what we shall know in heaven—God sees us. God loves us. In God we find our true selves. We find rest.

For now we see in a mirror, dimly, but then we will see face to face. Now I know only in part; then I will know fully, even as I have been fully known (1

Corinthians 13:12)

URGENT NEED FOR CONGREGATIONAL ACCOMPANI-MENT OF AFGHAN REFUGEES

In this season of Epiphany, as we remember our

refugee Savior who was forced to flee his birthplace as a tender baby, ELCA congregations are urged to help resettle these vulnerable people. Across the country, many congregations have already begun working with their local resettlement agencies and are sponsoring Afghan individuals and families, in addition to the many asylum-seekers currently being sponsored within the AMMPARO (Accompanying Migrant Minors with Protection, Advocacy, Representation and Opportunities) network. But the need is huge and right now. We call on congregations to see how they can engage in this important effort.

An information session entitled Boldly Serving Our Neighbors, will be held Feb 8, 2022, at 6 p.m. Central time, where ELCA congregations and synods can get questions answered about Afghan congregational sponsorship, regardless of location. Look for a link soon.

GIVE NOW FOR WILDFIRE RELIEF

While all disasters are tragedies and connect us with God's people wherever they occur, the Boulder County, CO wildfires affect us more closely since Mark Ostwald's parents, Doris and Phil Ostwald's home was one of the houses destroyed. We join in prayer and tangible signs of our concern as we are able.

On Dec. 30, the Marshall Fire ignited in Boulder County, Colo. Over 6,200 acres burned quickly, forcing the evacuations of 35,000 people. The fire spread throughout suburban neighborhoods, destroying at least 500 homes. While December wildfires are rare, the severe drought in the western United States created hazardous conditions that allowed the Marshall Fire to spread rapidly. This unusual fire is one of the impacts of a changing climate and will become increasingly more common.

Lutheran Disaster Response is engaging with the Rocky Mountain Synod and Lutheran Family Services Rocky Mountains to respond to the impact of the fires. We anticipate that immediate needs will include emotional and spiritual care, temporary shelters, food and other necessities. With local partners, Lutheran Disaster Response will continue to accompany survivors throughout the years of long-term recovery.



PRO TIPS FOR HEALTHY COMMUNICATION AT AMAZING GRACE

Healthy communication is important in the best of times. Throw in a pandemic and political turmoil and things can get messy. In the church we are especially careful to express our love for each other and for all our neighbors by practicing healthy communication skills. Some basics that are helpful in all relationships include the following.

- Everyone speaks for themselves. Each of us needs to take responsibility for expressing our own feelings or concerns.
- When there is a concern, we go directly to the person involved. Honest, direct, loving communication is the basis of all healthy relationships.
- If the concern is not resolved after direct communication, we ask a neutral person to join us in that conversation for the sake of understanding and healing.
- We avoid triangulation. Triangulation occurs when one person does not communicate directly with another person, instead using a third person to relay communication to the second. Triangulation distorts relationships and makes clear communication difficult.
- We pray for each other trusting that God loves us all and in prayer can heal our hurts and restore relationships.
