He kept annoying and confusing his disciples by eating with the wrong people, staying in the homes of THOSE people, touching the untouchable! Jesus searched out the most miserable, the most despised and he spent time with them, eating, listening, teaching, living.

#### **ALL ARE WELCOME!**

Holy week serves as a microcosm of life and faith and gives a glimpse into who ALL includes. It begins with hopeful possibilities. Palm Sunday is all hosannas, and cheers, and openness to Jesus' possibilities. But, by **Thursday** things get a little more REAL. Jesus washes the feet of the disciples; ALL the disciples, including Judas who will betray him, preparing the way for **Good Friday's** brutality. Confrontation, abuse, lies and death: death to Jesus and to those gathered in the sweep of criminals; death to the hope of Palm Sunday; death to the disciple's dreams of new possibility. Good Friday is the hard truth we'd all rather ignore and very often do, until

**Saturday** is silence; dreaded silence even though that's where Elijah found God (1 Kings 19:11-13).

we can no longer avoid it. Death is real. Our time

here is fleeting. There is an end to all things.

The latest Lutheran Magazine's lead article states that, "People are looking for three things in a church. Pastor Craig Mueller is quoted in the article saying, "What I'm finding these days in organized religion is **that the welcome is the main thing connecting people.** All churches say, 'You are welcome,' but part of that welcome is whoever you love or marry is welcome, too and whatever you may think of church or organized religion, you are welcome." He says that "young adults today want to feel that they can come and go on their own terms and they'll be given their space. They need to know that they won't be asked to be on a committee." That can be scary for people whose greatest concern is maintaining the programs and keeping the doors open. Mueller goes on to say, "We've forgotten what we're called to do—we're not here to keep the clubhouse open. We're called to bring God's word and we must do it in new and different ways."

As we gather for these last few weeks of Lent and then for the mystery and beauty of Holy Week, I hope you will feel the profound welcome God extends to you through every aspect of worship and life at Amazing Grace. But, also, let your attention be guided to see not only how YOU are welcomed by the community of Amazing Grace but how our words, our actions, our building, our music, our EVERYTHING is welcoming and IS NOT welcoming certain groups of people. God erects NO barriers or boundaries around God's love and God's welcome extended to all people for the healing and salvation of the world. We are called to extend that welcome and to change anything that may prevent that welcome from being known by everyone!

# **Holy Saturday**

# A SPACE BETWEEN GOOD FRIDAY AND EASTER

We don't pay a lot of attention to Holy Saturday other than as our day of preparation for Easter

Sunday. The youth group needs to get ready for the Easter breakfast. The altar guild is busy arranging lilies and preparing the altar. Grocery stores are filled. Eggs are dyed. We are occupied with busy anticipation. We have moved on from Good Friday. Even the Easter Vigil on Holy Saturday night looks forward to and heralds the resurrection.

We, of course, live after the first Easter. We do know how the story turns out, and it would be contrived to be in Holy Saturday as if we didn't know about the resurrection. But we are given this one holy day to pause. We are given this holy space to grieve, to be empty, to realize that life, as we know it, is over.

This is deeply uncomfortable in our culture. We see this on the news when people start to speak about closure immediately after a tragedy. This could be a well-meaning attempt to relieve the pain, but it doesn't heal. There is danger in moving too quickly from grief. It is important to resist the urge to usher the afflicted to "closure."

Grief from Sandy Hook, Mother Emmanuel, Katrina, San Bernardino and other tragedies cannot be rushed. None of the Good Fridays in our lives can. The resurrection came after an actual death. The crucifixion was not a metaphor. A heart stopped beating. He breathed his last. A son died. Mothers in Syria and El Salvador and the South Side of Chicago stand at the cross.

But Holy Saturday is more than the necessary and holy space to face death without denial and to grieve without the dulling anesthetic of sentimentality. There is something much deeper going on. It is an invitation to accept that life, as we know it, is over. All of our plans, all of our willfulness and all of our good intentions are over.

Our effort and righteousness as much as our sin bind us. Our effort to save our lives binds us. This is true as much for the church as it is for each member.

I'm grateful for the faithful innovation and hard work of our people and congregations. I'm not so far removed from parish ministry that I don't remember its struggles as well as its joys. There is something noble and dear about saints who come week after week, year after year to hear and receive the gospel and, as a response to grace, participate in God's reconciling work in the world. But there comes a time to take to heart Jesus' teaching: "For those who want to save their life will lose it, and those who lose their life for my sake will find it" (Matthew 16:25).

The day between Good Friday and Easter can be seen as empty, a void, something to be resisted at all costs, something to be filled. It is the same reaction that many in our culture have to silence. It's as if sound and activity prove that we still exist. But I think the space between crucifixion and resurrection — truly terrifying and truly compassionate — beckons us from our life to life in Christ. After all, it wasn't all the noise and fireworks that got Elijah's attention, but the sound of sheer silence (1 Kings 19:11-13).

When we shed our lives and enter the tomb, when silence is all around, then we see that Jesus is already there ahead of us, anticipating us, welcoming us to be still and to die in him and find our life in him. Rest, dear church.

## Syrian Refugee Update

Lutheran World Relief (LWR), with your help, has provided School Kits for classrooms in Damascus, Syria; Quilts & Kits for families in refugee camps in Lebanon and Jordan. Now LWR is providing Quilts & Kits to refugees who have reached Serbia. Since Oct 2012, LWR has shipped more than \$7 million in quilts and kits to Syrian refugees. And the needs keep growing. LWR also supports the ACT Alliance, a coalition of more than 140 churches and faith-based organizations providing aid to refugees in Greece, Hungary, and Serbia. #### Faith in Action — Quilts and Kits Ramp Up Refugee Crisis Response

By Nate King, LWR's Program Assistant for Constituent Engagement IN PAST ISSUES, WE HAVE SHARED STORIES ABOUT LWR'S WORK IN ASSISTING SYRIANS SUFFERING FROM VIOLENCE AND DISCORD IN THEIR HOMELAND. We've told you about the gift of School Kits for children in classrooms in Damascus, Syria. We've shared about the impact of Quilts and Kits for children and families in refugee camps in Lebanon and Jordan. Now, as many refugees have fled into Europe, we're excited to tell you that your Quilts and Kits are reaching Serbia.

For families finally arriving in Europe, their arrival means the end of a months-long journey with very few personal belongings. Your gifts of Quilts, Personal Care Kits, School Kits and Baby Care Kits are making their way into the hands of Syrian refugee families in Serbia. The need is incredible. Over the first seven months of 2015, the number of migrants and refugees applying for asylum in Serbia was nearly 250 percent greater than the number of people seeking asylum over the same period in 2014. About 15 percent of these and migrants are preschool and school-age children. For a child arriving in a refugee camp, an LWR School Kit can mean the opportunity to attend school for the first time in many months.

LWR's Carrie Taneyhill manages the process for sending shipments of Mission Quilts and Kits overseas, and she emphasizes the importance of these materials in the response to the crisis.

"Since winter is coming, these Quilts will provide much needed warmth to refugees who have arrived with no possessions," says Carrie Taneyhill. "LWR Kits provide refugees with items that are greatly needed but are unable to be purchased due to their cost."

Since October 2012, LWR has shipped more than \$7 million in Quilts and Kits to Syrian refugees. Your dedication and time make these efforts possible, as you graciously craft and assemble gift after gift for a person you will never meet.

## No one beyond God's reach

I was reminded that "no one is beyond God's reach" on our recent visit to the Shelton prison for its Saturday evening church service. While I've been to several prisons over the years as part of an educational activity, I had never gone to church in a prison.

We were welcomed by Pastor Norm Arnold who directed us through the security process. You might remember that Pastor Norm has preached at our church a few times. He told us that the men enjoy the presence of "regular" people and that they appreciate the opportunity to engage with folks in a more positive way than they experience most of the time. Our presence also sends a message that they are not forgotten human beings.

The area for the service was a large and inviting space with about 75 chairs. A group of musicians arrived early to practice the songs for the evening. It was clear that these were songs they had selected and in some case written. This group of men play a key role in the worship experience. After a while, another 30 or so men arrived. Most shook our hands and thanked us for coming. They were very respectful and pleasant.

While Pastor Norm is Lutheran, it wasn't a typical Lutheran church service. Liturgy and order of service as we know it was modified a bit but it was clear that it was a comfortable and meaningful format for the men who were there. A couple of times, Pastor Norm even asked if he could have an "Amen!" after he shared something about the powerful love that Jesus has for them. Have yet to hear that request at any other Lutheran church I've attended! It was fun!

The message made it clear that "no one is beyond God's reach". All are valuable and can have a relationship with Christ and know His love and salvation.

I found the experience of prayer and worship with these men to be positive and humbling. The Holy Spirit was present in that room and was touching us all.

If the opportunity arises in the future for you to visit, I encourage you to go. It is a powerful reminder of how Christ works not only in these men's lives but ours. *Blessings, Arlene Torgerson*


