Dear Friends in Christ,

Now after the Magi had left, an angel of the Lord appeared to Joseph in a dream and said, "Get up, take the child and his mother, and flee to Egypt, and remain there until I tell you; for Herod is about to search for the child, to destroy him." Then Joseph got up, took the child and his mother by night, and went to Egypt, and remained there until the death of Herod. (Matthew 2:13-15)



I am writing this Christmas letter to invite you to join with me in assisting refugees who live in our communities, in particular the **30 DACA students who attend Pacific Lutheran University in Tacoma**. St. Matthew's tells us that, soon after his birth, Mary and Joseph took Jesus and fled with him to Egypt in order to save him from a murderous King Herod. Like today's DACA children, Jesus became a child refugee carried by his parents across borders to save his life.

DACA stands for Deferred Action for Child Arrivals. In 2012, a presidential executive order was issued allowing children who were brought to the United States fleeing danger to remain here even though they are without immigration documents. DACA applicants must have arrived in the U.S. before 2007, when they were under the age of 16. They are allowed to live and work legally in the U.S. for renewable two-year periods. From 2012 to 2016, 800,000 children and teenagers signed up for this program. Approximately 30 of them are now students at PLU.

Early in 2017, President Trump cancelled this program and asked Congress to decide what to do with the DACA young people. However, Congress so far has done nothing, leaving DACA young people uncertain what will happen when their two-year permit ends in March 2108. They fear they will be deported back to a country of origin that they never really knew and where their lives are still in danger.

The vast majority of these DACA children have now grown up into their late teens and early twenties and are living as responsible, model citizens in the United States. Two weeks ago I met with five of the DACA students at PLU. They are wonderful, honors level students majoring in Psychology, Nursing, Business and Music. They are eager to use their talents and gifts in ways that serve and contribute to our American society. Having been invited by the US government to sign up in the DACA program, they are now completely uncertain about their future since the government has taken back its offer. **Please read "Valise of Hope", on page 10 of this newsletter** in which one of the PLU DACA students describes the experience of being brought to the United States as a child and his commitment to live a meaningful life, on page 10 of newsletter.

I would like to put together a Synod Task Force who will help the PLU DACA students in practical ways. **Would you like to work with me to do that?** The PLU students told me that they would welcome help in a variety of ways, including **legal advice, stress counseling, mentors who work in the careers they are seeking and help with acquiring used text books.** If you would like to volunteer for such a support task force, please email me at jaechre@plu.edu or call me at the Synod office, 253-535-8300.

In this Christmas season, we celebrate Immanuel – God with us - filling every moment of our lives. In Jesus, God comes to bring peace, joy, and healing to each one of us individually and to all of us collectively as God's family around the globe. **I am convinced that Jesus, the child refugee, has a special love for the children today who seek shelter and safety.** In this Christmas season, we also have an opportunity to bring Immanuel's love in tangible ways to the refugees who live among us.

May Christ be born anew in our lives and in our world!

Valise of Hope- The recollections of a PLU DACA student

On July 06, 2006, as a rain storm pelted the window, I saw the bodies of field workers bend into question marks, as they disappeared in the coffee fields. The adobe houses constructed by generations seemed to wash away with the rain—leaving behind the memory of soul-lifting smiles. As we ventured across the red deserts and purple mountains, my mother reminded me that there was an abundance of dreams in my suitcase ingrained with uncertainty.

This uprooting led to a profound eternal mourning for my traditions and my people. For it had been replaced with fear. Like cigarette smoke, the fear gets absorbed in from home, rising from my backpack, woven through the threads of my clothes and the fibers of my upbringing. "Don't tell anyone," was a phrase that resonated in my mind, bouncing off the walls of the classrooms and halls. The language barrier isolated me and I felt condemned by a nine-digit number I did not possess.

My parents came home with bone-deep exhaustion from being out in the fields all day. Carrying the full baskets of apples, oranges and grapes was not like the picture on the red raisin boxes I had seen at the markets; not like the woman wearing a fluffy bonnet, holding out the fruit with her smiling, ruby lips, the sun a flat orange orb behind her. A drowning sensation followed me home. I felt like I was being swallowed by blackness in order to produce commodity. I asked myself, "What makes a difference?" It boiled down to this: It was the *thinking*. How we think; how we look at situations, whether or not we see ourselves being successful.

What was stopping me was my own fear. I learned to identify it and rejected it. Hence, I zealously committed myself to learning three languages. Effective communication and education became one of many diverse means of accessing my dreams. Progressing from reading, writing, and speaking my native language (Spanish) at a third grade level to a university level, galvanized a novel perspective: Everything that I do, it's going to have to be twice as excellent.

Eleven years later I am a college student and still don't have a green card. However, I realize the power of our thoughts—a fractal moment in time. With the support of family, faculty, and friends, I was able to unleash the brain power to gradually transform my situation.


