"I listen to children describe their hopes, dreams and concerns for our Earth and their desire to be part of the change needed for a society of inclusion and love for all. I listen to their aching hearts while breathing in and taking in their worries and breathing out and handing it all to a God." Teresita L.

Watching the beautiful stained glass come down in the sanctuary I could not help but think of all the changes



that have happened in the world and in this congregation in the 100 +/- years since they were first installed; the hopes and dreams that first generation held, many of which were never realized; some that were transformed and many that must have been discarded.

As we move into a changed world, redefined by pandemic, war, climate change and so many other forces beyond our control, we may long for the return of the windows when they are restored and repaired, gleaming with rejuvenated color, sturdy from repair and replaced structure, a sign of the return of the past and the long forgotten hopes of our ancestors: a church full of life, young people, fresh commitment and boundless possibility.

But the future is always dependent upon the past; upon the events that take place and upon the choices made by previous generations. So, my invitation in the coming weeks and months, as we live with the stark, unadorned light pouring in from all sides, light which has been filtered through the beauty of color and shape for all these years, let us live in THIS time, eyes wide open to what IS and to what MUST BE, given the reality of all that has happened in the last 100 years and all the challenges that lie ahead.

Martin Luther famously compared God and the church to a fortress in which the faithful could retreat and regroup and come out fighting. Today, it is more appropriate and perhaps even necessary that we sit in the reality of our time, the full light streaming in to reveal the accumulated assumptions, biases, and misplaced trust that have become so familiar that we are not longer even aware of them. Only then, may we be able to commit to a future that is led by and based only on the life and love of the one to whom the angel in our altar picture points, the risen Christ.

We do this hard work for the sake of the children described in the quote at the top of this page. The future is not a continuation of the past, nor can we count on it being like anything any of us can imagine. We must sit in the stark light of reality, listen to the hopes, dreams and fears of those who must live in that future and will be responsible for living the faith, a faith that is based on the love and call of God as they will experience that.

Please join me in this discipline of living in this time with eyes and hearts wide open. The prayer of Fr. Richard Rohr is a good place to begin:

God, Lord of all creation, lover of life and of everything, please help us to love in our very small way what You love infinitely and everywhere. We thank You that we can offer just this one prayer and that will be more than enough, because in reality everything and everyone is connected, and nothing stands alone. To pray for one part is really to pray for the whole, and so we do. Help us each day to stand for love, for healing, for the good, for the diverse unity of the Body of Christ and all creation, because we know this is what You desire: as

Jesus prayed, that all may be one. We offer our prayer together with all the holy names of God, we offer our prayer together with Christ, our Lord. Amen.



"I prayed with head bowed on my bosom, as though I grieved for a friend or a brother; I went about as one who laments for a mother, bowed down and in mourning" (Psalm 35:13b-14, New Revised Standard Version Updated Edition).

Dear Church,

Our prayers are with the family of Jayland Walker as they laid him to rest on Wednesday in Akron, Ohio, a place I know well and a community dear to my heart. We join all who gathered to mourn the brutal killing of their loved one. We remember also Daunte Wright, Sandra Bland, Philando Castile and Patrick Lyoya — just a handful of the multitude of other cases where a "routine" traffic stop ended with the death of a Black person. As we mourn, remember and await justice, so also must we act.

As people of hope, we must ask, when will such killings end? When will we no longer have to mourn the death of another like Jayland Walker, Breonna Taylor, Daunte Wright or George Floyd? As a church, we have acknowledged that "rooted in slavery, racism is manifested through the history of Jim Crow policies, racial segregation, the terror of lynching, extrajudicial killings by law enforcement, and the disproportionate incarceration of people of color" ("Declaration of the ELCA to People of African Descent," p. 2).

Sadly, we know this will not end until the system is reformed. Police forces throughout this nation are designed to protect and serve, but clearly the system does not protect and serve everybody. Police departments, like many institutions, including the church, sustain structural racism. We cannot fault the individual officer for their racist actions without also faulting the overall system for enabling, and even encouraging, those actions. Structural racism is the reason that, since 2017, nearly 600 people have been killed by police after routine traffic stops (MappingPoliceViolence.us). In 2021, 28% of innocent people whose deaths were caused by police

were Black, despite being only 13% of the U.S. population.

We must continue to educate ourselves about problems in policing and the police system today. Resources such as Campaign Zero show us that there are obstacles to effective reform but also that meaningful reform is possible and even necessary. For example, in Lansing, Michigan, changing the reasons for traffic stops reduces the chances of violence, but there is still a massive disparity between the number of Black and white drivers pulled over. In other words, the work must continue beyond learning about the problem, lamenting the problem and taking small steps toward reducing the problem. Long-term, meaningful action must be initiated and sustained.

We, as a church, must join in the call to reform our police forces to ensure that they not only continue to serve and protect but also serve everyone in our communities, regardless of skin color, ethnic background, gender identity, sexuality or creed. We call on the U.S. Senate, following the action already taken by the House, to pass the George Floyd Justice in Policing Act and for the enactment of similar police reform proposals under consideration at the state level, such as HB 1267, passed into law in 2021 in Washington state.

Jayland Walker's death could have been prevented if we had a police system that acted without prejudice in every instance, respecting each person's dignity.

This has been a project our church has participated in for decades. Unlike here, many children in the world cannot attend school without supplies, so this is an important gift that allows a child to get an education! It is time to start buying the items for our bags. Stores are beginning to have sales and specials on school supplies so now is the time to jump in and help out.

Here are three ways you can participate:

1) Pick up bag(s) to fill from the table in the Parish

Hall. The list of needed items is stapled to the front of each bag. Return the filled bag(s) to one of the boxes under the table.

- 2) Pick up a list of supplies from the table in the Parish Hall and buy whatever supplies you wish to. These should also be returned to the boxes under the Parish Hall table.

REFUGEE RESPONSE Lutheran Community Services Northwest

I hope that seeing the sun shining reminds us all to hold onto hope as the news continues to be hard and heavy. Even when it feels overwhelming, together we are making a difference every day for our refugee neighbors.

As you know, LCS Northwest has been navigating two concurrent refugee crises.

The first began with swift withdrawal of US forces from Afghanistan, prompting millions of Afghans to flee their country. The Southwestern Washington Synod seeks to form and support trustworthy, inclusive lay leaders who are grounded in Christian faith and in a Lutheran expression of faith. The Program for Strengthening Active Lay Ministry (PSALM) is designed for congregation members who have discerned a call to more intentional and public lay leadership in their congregation and community.

PSALM is a two-year program that takes place over

The coursework for the term is introduced at the retreat by a variety of presenters who bring expertise to the topics.
