In last month's newsletter I offered some of Brian McLaren's thoughts on what it means to be the church together, specifically his ideas about how the Holy Spirit leads us when we have the humility to stop and listen and are willing to follow wherever the Spirit leads us.

In the last two months of the season of discipleship before Advent begins and we dive deep into what it means that God was born among us, as one of us, we should not miss the opportunity to do just that: stop and listen and receive the Holy Spirit's guidance with humility.

We do this individually as we prepare our hearts through prayer. I commend to you the practice of Centering Prayer which has the power to radically reshape you, ready or not, if you let it. It is a deceptively simple yet life-changing form of prayer that requires only that you simply SHOW UP and let God be God for you. Sounds simple. There is nothing harder. We sit day after day as beginners welcoming God to form us, expecting nothing, asking only to be open to the presence of God. (See the basics of Centering Prayer on the next page.)

We do this as communally as we gather weekly, returning again and again to the prayers and songs, scripture and meal that have the power to shape us, mature us, and sustain us through all of life's changes.

Diana Butler Bass suggests that our lives as Christians are shaped as Jesus' life was shaped by the repeating cycle of: TABLE - trial - cross - tomb - TABLE. We gather at the table where Christ is host and meal. We are sent out into the world (together) to face the trials and bear the crosses that life hands us, to face the tombs that we inevitably encounter at points in our lives. And then we return again to the table (together!)

There is no other group that gathers in this way, no social group that will tell you the truth about who you are and love you and celebrate you and promise to walk with you through whatever life hands you! Everything we do as a church is for this purpose – to live together as disciples of Jesus for the sake of our witness in word and action to the limitless love, grace and mercy of God. May we sustain one another on this journey, dear siblings in Christ! Pastor Val

He was a young man. In his early 20s. He had cancer. His mother and stepfather cared for him to the point of weariness. The family was unchurched, but a friend was a member of our parish and asked if I could visit them. That's how I came to walk with them in the last months.

There were hospitalizations and finally palliative care. The young man endured with stoic courage. His mother and stepfather never waivered in their care. Friends supported the family by bringing meals and sometimes just sitting in silence with them. At last, the call I knew was coming came. The young man had died.

I drove to the farmhouse past the cemetery where he would be buried. When I arrived the stepfather opened the door and motioned me to the living room. The young man had died in his mother's arms. He had stopped shaving some weeks before, so his beard had grown in. Mother cradling the body of her dead son. It was a modern-day pietà.

In my time with the family, I found out that the stepfather was not baptized. I'll call him Jim. We had many talks sitting at the wooden kitchen table some profound, some less so.

And Jim had questions: not so much why this had happened to his stepson, but where was God? Where was hope? He knew his wife and son had been baptized. Jim wanted to know what that meant, what difference it made.

I answered that God was with Jim's stepson in his pain. I explained that baptism was the gift of life that brought forgiveness, that baptism made us part of the body of Christ, the church, and that

CENTERING PRAYER

- 1. Choose a sacred word as the symbol of your intention to consent to God's presence and action within.
- 2. Sitting comfortably and with eyes closed, settle briefly, and silently introduce the sacred word.
- 3. When you become aware of thoughts, return ever-so-gently to the sacred word.
- 4. At the end of the prayer period, remain in silence for a couple of minutes.

baptism made those who had been strangers from God and each other part of the same family. I told him that baptism was an unbreakable relationship between God and God's people because God loves us and doesn't want to lose a single one of us, that not even death can separate us from God's love.

Jim asked to be baptized. He came to the realization that, as it has been said, water really is thicker than blood. Baptism doesn't guarantee a life without struggle or hardship, but it makes us part of the one who suffered, died and was buried—and who, through that suffering and death, defeated death. So, at that wooden kitchen table with a stainless steel mixing bowl filled with water, Jim was baptized into Christ.

"Do you not know that all of us who have been baptized into Christ Jesus were baptized into his death? Therefore we have been buried with him by baptism into death, so that, just as Christ was raised from the dead by the glory of the Father, so we too might walk in newness of life. For if we have been united with him in a death like his, we will certainly be united with him in a resurrection like his" (Romans 6:3-5).

We have been through a difficult season in our country and our church. I'm not sure if we will ever completely understand the effects of the pandemic's stress on all of us. The pandemic laid bare racial inequities and disparities in access to medical care, housing, employment and law enforcement. Civic discourse has become coarse and mean. Life is seen as a zero-sum game—if your side gets something then mine loses out.

This is also played out in the church. Of course

there is room for debate and disagreement, there is room to call out one part of the church when it has hurt another. There is even room for justified anger. But there is no room to dissolve the bond of baptism. It isn't even possible. In Christ we are individually members one of another. Sometimes we might feel like we are stuck with each other. This is the great mystery and beauty of the wounded body of Christ—we are woven together. Praise the One who makes us one. *Bishop Eaton*

DON'T GO TO CHURCH FOR YOURSELF!

Jesus: "Whenever you did it for any of my people, no matter how unimportant they seemed, you did it for me."

Gathering for church is a strange kind of event. On some levels it has the outward appearance of a concert venue. Those arriving enter, receive a bulletin, then sit down like an audience.

At a concert the **expectations of the audience are pretty minimal....**" "You don't spill your beer on anyone. Besides that the bar is rather low. Everyone is there to see the band and listen to the music. Expectations are set for the performance, not the audience. This is the definition of a crowd.

Church, at least theoretically, is not like that at all. When the church gathers it is because **something is expected of those who arrive.** The church is the gathered community of Jesus, the one who taught repeat-

edly to focus on "the least of these" and "love your neighbor...."

"I'm going to repeat something here I repeat often in many contexts. *You really shouldn't go to church for yourself.* Now, what exactly do I mean by this?

Consider: if you go to church for yourself then you prioritize your own preferences. You place at the top of your agenda the style of music, how much you will get out of the sermons, whether you like the seats, whether you can network at the church to build business connections, etc.

But, if you go to church for others: then you hope the music meets the needs of some small children dancing near you. You scan the gathered congregation and look to see who is alone who may need a friend. You wonder what spiritual gifts you can bring to

the community to strengthen it. You ask yourself whether committing to that church will further social justice in your community.

When you go to church for others, you live into the eschatological parable Jesus teaches in Matthew 25. You go trusting that "if you are there for someone, as unimportant as they seem, you are there for Jesus."

I know it's wild, but Jesus really teaches that when

you go to church, **you will encounter Christ** *in your neighbor*. It's like that other line in Scripture about entertaining angels unawares (Hebrews 13), when you gather in Christian community you find yourself face-to-face with Jesus/angels/God.

No wonder some of us are tempted to go to church for ourselves: it's a lot more risky and scary to anticipate we may be meeting God...."
