Most have you have heard by now that after much prayer and a long discernment process, I have decided to retire effective August 1st, my last Sunday leading worship at Amazing Grace being July 30th. Since our June and July newsletters are combined, I want to share a few thoughts about this time of change.

Encouraged by Paul's words to the Philippians, I am committed to being even more intentional than ever to paying attention to where God is showing up in my life and in the life of the congregation. In this beautiful season gardens are often on my mind. Steve and I have been planning our gardens for awhile now. What began as pandemic diversion has grown into a satisfying, almost meditative practice at times. Our plans have evolved with the passing seasons, with our growing understanding of what thrives in this rainy climate and what certainly does not, and with the realization that one city lot can only hold so many trees, one raised bed can only grow so many tomatoes. If we try to push beyond those limits the harvest is diminished and the quality of our fruits and vegetables suffers. Knowing limits, our gardens and our own is an act of faithful stewardship.

Seems to me that all of life is a garden, full of beautiful flowers, tended and nurtured over the years. And every garden sprouts weeds, despite our efforts to reduce their population. They are tenacious. Gardening life has taught me that both flowers and weeds are gifts. That each teaches us and stretches us and deepens our understanding in its own way. Most importantly, not holding too tightly the distinctions between weed and flower deepens our dependence on God's grace. I have been surprised by how many times, what I originally identified as a flower turned out to be a weed and many a weed has grown to be a treasured flower in the garden of my life.

Living within the limits given to us, to all of us, is an act of faithful stewardship. So, leaving Amazing Grace at this time is something I do with a sense of acknowledging limits and celebrating everything with gratitude. To name only a few of the things for which I am thankful, I give thanks:

for all the ways we have faithfully followed Jesus in loving God and loving our neighbors together.

For each moment of our lives shared; moments of joy and celebration and moments of sorrow and confusion, even despair – that we were blessed with the presence and love of each other, tangible expressions of God's love for each of us.

For the strength and resilience you hold within you as the body of Christ in this place – strength in learning how God is calling the church into new forms for a new world; resilience in the face of the unknown whether that is a pandemic and the new ways it forced us to worship and form community or it is a world changed by increased division and polarization forcing us to learn anew what it means to live as people radically shaped by and for LOVE.

For the image of God that You, each of you carry within you.

For the Holy Spirit that has been promised will always be with us, advocating for us, comforting us, guiding us into the future, individually and as a congregation.

And leaving Amazing Grace at this time is done with a sense of sadness and glad anticipation in equal measures. Leaving those you love behind is difficult AND I trust that:

God is guiding all of us into God's good future.

God is preparing each of you with new strengths for ministry that will stretch you to serve God's mission to love the world.

God is preparing a new leader who will come to love you as I do and lead you as God empowers and calls them to lead for a new time.

The prayer of St. Brendan seems especially helpful to me in this time. The story goes that St. Brendan set sail in a small coracle of wood and oxhide from Ireland and ended up in Newfoundland, an amazing achievement in the 5th century.

The Prayer of St. Brendan Help me to journey beyond the familiar and into the unknown. Give me the faith to leave old ways and break fresh ground with You.

Christ of the mysteries, I trust You to be stronger than each storm within me. I will trust in the darkness and know that my times, even now, are in Your hand. Tune my spirit to the music of heaven, and somehow, make my obedience count for You.

I look forward to seeing each of you in the coming weeks! In Christ, Pastor Val



At the 2022 Churchwide Assembly, the decision was taken to establish a Commission for a Renewed Lutheran Church to "reconsider the statements of purpose for each of the expressions of this church, the principles of its organizational structure, and all matters pertaining thereunto, being particularly attentive to our shared commitment to dismantle racism." This is no small task!

The Commission for a New Lutheran Church that led to the formation of the ELCA completed its work 35 years ago—before TikTok, smartphones, and telemedicine. Even MTV was relatively new. The world has changed a lot since then, so perhaps it is time to take a look at our statements of purpose and principles of organizational structure.

There has been a range of reaction to this—excitement, trepidation, a call to tear the church down completely and then rebuild it, requests to maintain the status quo, and everything else in between. There has even been the suspicion

voiced by some that a cabal of churchwide leaders on Higgins Road has already completed the project (actually, no). We have committed to being a thriving church rooted in tradition and radically relevant—the tradition being our theology, not culture or cuisine.

The church is unique among institutions. It is divine and also very human. It is the only institution whose reason for being is to preach the gospel in its purity and to administer the sacraments according to the gospel. "The Church is a people created by God in Christ, empowered by the Holy Spirit, called and sent to bear witness to God's creative, redeeming, and sanctifying activity in the world" (ELCA Constitution 4.01).

Do we always get it right? No. Since, as it has been said, the church is not a hotel for saints, but a hospital for sinners, there are many things in the long history of the church and in the much shorter history of this church that have caused harm—even deadly harm—to people and creation. And yet, God continues to use

the church and our branch of it to be an ambassador of hope and to keep telling the radical story of grace. We are a both/and church that understands the baptized to be at once saints and sinners.

Here is part of an essay by 20th-century Roman Catholic brother Carlo Carretto:

"How baffling you are, oh Church, and yet how I love you! How you have made me suf fer, and yet how much I owe you! I would like to see you destroyed, and yet I need your presence. You have given me so much scan dal and yet you have made me understand what sanctity is. I have seen nothing in the world more devoted to obscurity, more com promised, more false, and yet I have touched nothing more pure, more generous, more beautiful. How often have I wanted to shut the doors of my soul in your face, and how often I have prayed to die in the safety of your arms."

That pretty well sums up the beautiful, maddening, sublime and broken reality of the church and of its

people. God alone preserves the church and God alone renews it. But God, in God's inscrutable wisdom, continues to call, gather, enlighten and make "holy the whole Christian church on earth and keeps it with Jesus Christ in the one common, true faith" (Small Catechism) and invites sinners to be part of the body of Christ.

I call all of us to be in prayer for the Commission for a Renewed Lutheran Church. The commission will

meet together for the first time in July. Pray for openness to God's Spirit, humility in discernment, and bold trust that God will bless our efforts as we seek to give the gospel free course in the world.



TIPS FOR HOSTING FELLOWSHIP HOUR

- -- Check the schedule to see when you are hosting. If your name is first on the list it is your responsibility to coordinate with the others
- --Have someone on your team check kitchen supplies to make sure needed things are there i.e.; cups, coffee, sugar, etc. If you cannot bring a supply item, call the church office and we will get some help
- --Our sacred (?) rule is to have coffee and something to eat with it! People also appreciate other things to drink, i.e. juice, water, hot tea. It's your choice of food items.
- --You can bring paper plates or use church dishes, the latter requires you to use the dishwasher. Instructions are available in the kitchen

- --Napkins--there are cloth napkins in the kitchen you may choose to use. If so, please launder them and return before next Sunday. Usually there are napkins in the cupboard, but you may also choose to bring your own. Any color is fine. Alternately you can choose to go with the liturgical colors of the day as used in the sanctuary.
- --Tablecloth--the large tablecloths are in the cabinet between the table and the window or already on the table.
- --Please launder any cloth items used, i.e. towels, tablecloth, etc. and return before next Sunday.
- --If you need more people on your team please contact Lynette Lile or the church office and we will try to be helpful.

FELLOWSHIP COMMITTEE WHAT IS IT?

Since I am filling in for the unexpired council term for Fellowship Ministry I thought I better find out what I am supposed to do. In simple terms the By-laws explain that this ministry will promote and supervise the fellowship programs of the congregation in 4 ways:

- 1- Promote ways in which new members shall be made to feel welcome and receive instruction in the Lutheran faith as well as orientation to Amazing Grace Lutheran Church.
- 2- Provide opportunities for fellowship events

If you cannot bring them please contact the church office and we will fill in.

There are many quietly generous people in this congregation which Is the reason why all these events work so well. It Is mostly a bottom-up as opposed to a top-down way of generating great fellowship together.



SOUTHWESTERN WASHINGTON SYNOD NEWS

From Suzan Stegemoeller

"The Southwestern Washington Synod is that portion of western Washington State from the Columbia River in the south up through Tacoma to Federal Way, Auburn and Enumclaw in the north. It then curves westward around the Puget Sound (Salish Sea) to include all of the Olympic Peninsula. Our Synod, then, reaches from the Columbia to Canada, and from the Cascades to the Pacific Ocean.



We acknowledge that this land and water is the traditional territory of 16 federally recognized Native American tribes: the Chehalis, Cowlitz, Hoh, Jamestown S'Klallam, Lower Elwha Klallam, Makah, Muckleshoot, Nisqually, Port Gamble S'Klallam, Puyallup, Quileute, Quinault, Shoalwater Bay, Skokomish, Squaxin Island, and Suquamish, as well as additional tribes not recognized by the federal government, including the Chinook. The surrounding mountains, valleys, shorelines, and waterways are imbued with their presence. We seek to nurture our relationship with our Native American neighbors and our shared responsibilities to this place, their homelands, where we mutually abide.

The ministry of our Synod is carried out by the 30,000 members and leaders of our 88 congregations and special ministries, including chaplains, deacons, mission developers, and our partner ministries, such as Lutheran Community Services NW, Pacific Lutheran University, and the Faith Action Network. Our Synod Office is in Tacoma, WA.

The Southwestern Washington Synod is one of 65 synods that comprise the Evangelical Lutheran Church in



America. We are part of Region I of the ELCA, which is made up of the six synods in Washington, Oregon, Montana, and Alaska. The word "synod" comes from the Greek language and means "walking the road together". From: swwasynod.org

The assembly began and ended with worship and prayer. I was elected to serve as the female layperson representative on Synod Council for the Coastal Region of SWWA Synod. My first meeting with the council is on June 10 in Longview WA. I ask for your prayers and support as I fulfill this new position.

CTC AMAZING GRACE 3RD STAGE REPORT

At a Congregation meeting on 3/26/23, more than 40 members gathered to discuss three defining aspects of ministry and mission. The question put before the gathering was: imagine in 1 year's time from now, what programs worked successfully, what resources were available and which people contributed their time and talents to make those programs successful.

I am grateful to Liz for accurately writing down the comments that were orally offered.

A summation of what was reported to the group now follows.

Five categories of programing emerged:

- 1. Sunday worship and programing;
- 2. Outreach events;
- 3. Communication modes;
- 4. Internal organization; and,
- 5. Conflict reduction processes.

First, Sunday mornings: Uplifting worship services; joyful worshipful moments particularly at the end of worship; a sense of peace entering the building that lasts throughout the morning's worship; youth involvement; solid preaching; uplifting music; active Sunday School programming. For programming, creating new Small Groups and strengthen current Small Groups and Bible study opportunities; partnering with local churches for VBS; listening to the needs of youth (people with healthy passionate involvement with youth are elected to church governing positions and regularly report to Congregation); marking important social milestones for member families.

Second, Outreach: Strong connection with Family Promise that includes emphasizing congregational support for the program as well as making the program and its connection to AG more visible to the surrounding community; making space available for music and providing instruments and practice time for performance from and to the community; sponsoring community dinners; knowing (and agreeing upon) mission actions; integrating those who would be new members; strengthening current missional ministries; cementing AG's reputation for being advocates for the homeless people in your community; making known public advocates for civic involvement who are members of AG; some members are well professionally networked in Aberdeen; PSALM program is strong, vibrant and expanding; Music program grows because high schoolers and college students are invited in; partnering with City/County entities on low income housing.

Third, Communication modes: greater mobilization of social media platforms to send more information to members and community; frequent opportunities for congregation-wide intentional communication and (respectfully curious) conversations.

Fourth, Internal organization: enthusiastic leaders are elected for governance positions and opportunities are created for intentionally nurturing future leaders; people believe we can accomplish what we set out to do; examine what resources are available to accomplish our agreed upon goals; effective stewardship program tied to anticipated goals; programs/events that strengthen fellowship in our church community; determine priority of decision making in the congregation, (eg does Council decide or does congregation decide or do small groups decide or does Pastor decide or what combination of the above determines curse of action?); celebrating 20th anniversary of merger.

Fifth, Conflict resolution processes: establish and publish "Code of Conduct" for respectful communication; use the process of "1-2-4 All" to gain broader understanding of perceptions of ministry issues; develop a process for moving on through difficult problems; continue healing processes; open up and discuss the issues pertaining to Trinity; have prayer time when issues arise.

Next step suggestion: regather an appropriate group – could be Council, selected individuals, whole congregation – to rank the above items and then set about determining what resources are available and who will do the steps necessary to make the dream actually happen in a year. Of course, unless the Lord has blessed whatever ideas emerge, they won't happen. We pray for that blessing and wisdom!


