WHO IS A "REAL" AMERICAN?



My husband and I live in Skokie, Ill., a diverse community. Our neighbors to the west are an octogenarian Taiwanese Evangelical couple who regularly order meals from Kosher to Go. Our neighbors to the east are a Ukrainian and Russian multigenerational family. Our grocery stores have both kosher and halal departments. As I drive past the elementary school on my way to work, I see moms and dads in jeans along with women in saris or hijabs and men in thobes or yarmulkes. More than 90 languages are spoken in the homes of our school district. We pay our taxes, mow our (tiny) lawns, worship, raise our children and pretty much get along in our little village of Skokie.

Late one afternoon a few years ago I was finishing up yard work. I had been weeding and trimming all day. I was tired and grass-stained. Just one more pile of leaves needed to be swept up. I noticed a woman walking toward me so I hurried to get the sidewalk cleared. She stopped and told me that she had seen me working all day and thought I might be too tired to prepare supper. She had made a meal for me and my husband. It was during Ramadan—the month when Muslims fast from food and water during the day and engage in prayer and acts of charity. This was her act of charity and generosity. She smiled and walked away. I was stunned.

There has been an alarming rise in hate speech and violence against religious and ethnic minorities in this country. At the same time, we've seen an increased polarization among us, even in our dear church. There is a movement to define what it means to be a "real American." Some would define this as white, Christian and native born. When Lutheran immigrants first came to this country in the 18th and 19th centuries, they weren't considered real Americans. They didn't speak English or fit in with the Deist, Calvinist religious majority. They were "other" and therefore suspect. German Lutheran immigrants weren't considered white when they settled here. Neither were Irish, Italians or Poles. Catholics and Jews were considered an alien threat.

t's ironic that the Puritans fled religious persecution and that the First Amendment states "Congress shall make no law respecting an establishment of religion, or prohibiting the free expression thereof," yet an element in our country wants to legislate that the United States is a Christian nation where Christianity should be privileged and only Christians should hold office. This is Christian Nationalism, which is neither Christian nor patriotic. There is no doubt that the Founders were Christian and that a majority of Americans identify as Christian. That is different from declaring Christianity as the established religion of the United States. And, dear church, let's be clear, a Christian Nationalist does not define Lutherans as "Christian."

God knows I love my country. This beautiful, fragile, yet surprisingly resilient experiment in democracy and nationhood that's not predicated on shared ethnicity is unique among nations. My grandfather, father and uncles all served during World War I and World War II. I had the honor of placing a wreath on behalf of the ELCA at the Tomb of the Unknown Soldier in Arlington National Cemetery. I won't have my patriotism questioned. Christian Nationalism is a perversion of the gospel and a threat to our democracy. It's precisely because I love my country that I warn against it.

Who is a "real American"? I say that my Muslim neighbor walking freely down the street in a hijab to offer a meal to her Christian neighbor during Ramadan is a real American. Motivated by her Muslim faith she acted as neighbor to me. She is not less American because she is Muslim. Because she is an American, she can be her authentic self and participate in building our community and country. What binds us together is not ethnicity but shared participation in our civic life springing out of our cultural heritages and working for the common good.

GROWING AT AMAZING GRACE

IS IT TIME TO CHANGE THE QUESTIONS YOU ARE ASKING ABOUT YOUR CHURCH?

I was recently asked by my pastor, Melanie Vaughn-Colwell of Oakhurst Baptist Church, to be part of a conversation sermon. This is where two or more people sit in front of the congregation to discuss the scripture and themes together, instead of a more traditional pulpit sermon by one individual.

I was honored to be asked and was especially excited because of the topic she suggested: What questions should the Body of Christ be asking ourselves in 2023?

As a researcher, this is the kind of conversation that I have with churches all the time. These questions are ones that have been asked for decades:

- Why is our church shrinking?
- How can we get more people to come to church?
- How can we survive financially?

• How can we make hard decisions without people getting mad?

• How can we get back to the way things were when the pews and coffers were full?

The curiosities and frameworks that lie beneath the surface of these questions are more accurately represented as: • A church's growth or decline is based mostly on internal factors, so if we shrink we must be doing something wrong, and if we "fix" things we will grow.

• A "good" church has more people participating year over year, and certainly not less.

• A church's survival depends on traditional financial models (i.e. giving budget).

• A church is better off when things stay noncontroversial and keep the peace.

• A church's survival in a form that looks like a glorified past is the ultimate goal.

I have to admit that when I started working with churches, I saw most of those frameworks as accurate and helpful for church health and vitality. I'm almost embarrassed to look back on that now. Melanie's brilliant question reminded me that new times call for new questions, and finding new ways forward means we must often leave old frameworks behind. Asking new questions generates alternate curiosities and evolves our understanding of what it means to be Christians together, whether or not we call it "church."

As Melanie and I explored these questions together, and as I reflected afterward, I came away with a few new



questions and new frameworks to accompany them.

1. How is God calling a particular group of people to fellowship, break bread, learn, and serve together this month/quarter/year?

2. Together as a congregation, are we enough to truly build community and honestly know and be known (a favorite Oakhurst Baptist Church phrase)?

3. Is our church a learning lab for navigating life's changes and conflicts in healthy and transformative ways?

4. What kind of church does God need to heal the world in 2023, in 2053, and in 2123?

Having now asked these new questions, an updated framework goes something like this:

• Groups of people are called together by God to do Christian life together.

• The forms this will take are unique and local and will vary as much as the flora and fauna that surrounds us.

• Truly "doing life together" requires more than 1 hour per week in order to

share practice, build community, and truly know and be known.

• Christian life together should teach and model healthy communication, and transformational change skills, and must focus on the well-being of others more than ourselves.

It is plausible that this new framework will continue to evolve, if not fully change, over the course of the next decade. But I continue to feel it has great potential to change the way we model how people called by God are to do life together. Whether or not those groups look, sound, or act like old models of "church" is irrelevant.

We must ask new questions, lean into new curiosities, and build new frameworks to lean into the new things God is doing in and with us. It's okay if they are not perfect – now or never. We have room to get things wrong and try again. Because no matter what, God is with us in all of it, loving and holding us as we question, explore, and build.

Thank you for your continuing strong support for the ministry of the Southwestern Washington Synod and your partnership with us. I have seen you carry out your own ministry with so much creativity and courage as you care for one another and reach out in ministry to your neighbors!

In addition to financially supporting your congregation's ministry, you are sending a percentage of your offerings to the Southwestern Washington Synod as Mission Support, so that we can together carry out important ministries. Here are some of the ministries that we are doing as a Synod right now.

- The Synod is assisting 14 congregations who are in the process of calling a new pastor.

- The Synod's Candidacy Committee currently provides guidance, mentoring and support for fifteen people from our Synod who are attending seminary and preparing to become pastors or deacons.
- Our First Third of Life Committee supports the youth and young adult ministries of Synod congregations and the ALYVE Board.
- The Synod brings together Work Teams made up of members of our congregations, who work together to address important justice issues, including Hunger, Racism, and ministry with the Native American and Reconciling in Christ communities.

The Synod passes on 40% of your Mission Support to our national ELCA ministry, which carries out such vital ministries as:

- Supporting the work of 150 missionaries around the world
- Training new pastors and deacons in seven ELCA seminaries
- Providing food and agricultural training to hungry people.
