

Despite our culture of self-indulgence, we too are called to walk an alternative path – one of humility, justice, and peace. That is the way of grace.

That is the way of Lent.

In a world where everyone knows someone struggling with addiction, where isolation and loneliness are epidemic, in a county that ranks among the highest for "deaths of despair," **what difference does faith make?** In that reality, what has God to say to us? What can the church offer **this** broken world?

We've focused on ALLELUIAS during the season of Epiphany, naming even those situations when an Alleluia (from the Hebrew for praise/thank God) comes unexpectedly out of pain or sorrow. But, the reality is that as Leonard Cohen so beautifully told us, "Love is not a victory march. It's a cold and it's a broken Hallelujah" even, and maybe especially God's love because it is never superficial or trite, but always real, and honest, and life-giving!

While some people get rich trying to convince us we can buy our way to love or happiness or fulfillment there has never been a time when that was true. That has always been a lie.

The season of Lent is meant for just such a time as this! We're often told that the cure for this deep sickness is all on us. Can't you just heard the stale commands: Pull yourself together! Buck up! Pull yourself up by your bootstraps! Or the unhelpful but loving advice: You just need some fresh air or..... (fill in the blank) exercise; meditation; organic food; vacation, supplements...

But, we were never meant to live like this: alone even in a relationship; lonely even in a crowd, because we've been told we can only rely on ourselves; we must maintain the charade pretending to have it all together; things that only reinforce the idea that it's up to us, if only we try harder or work smarter...".

Lent offers us six week in which to practice **rejecting that lie, that sin** when we internalize it. That rejection is called repentance from our Old Testament heritage, the heritage that Jesus claimed as his own. "Don't even begin to think that I have come to do away with the Law and the Prophets. I haven't come to do away with them but to fulfill them." Matthew 5: 17-20

"But this is not generic repentance for generic sin. I believe, rather the sin addressed concerns for Jews too eager to become Babylonians, too easy to compromise Jewish identity, Jewish faith, Jewish discipline – in order to get along in a Babylonian empire (or Americans, or French, or Japanese, whatever the culture) that had faith in other gods with other disciplines. The (Lenten) imperatives are summons to come back to an original identity, an elemental discipline, a primal faith."

That's from *A Way Other Than Our Own* by Walter Brueggemann, our Lenten study this year. In it, Brueggemann offers a short, daily refocus of our situa-

tion in this world here and now seen through the lens of life in the captivity of forces out of our control – which has always been the reality in this world.

I hope you'll consider accepting this invitation to reject the lie that you need to try harder or be more or especially buy more and join in the joyful but challenging work of embracing the gift of community with others longing to be free, to be themselves: beautiful expressions of God's image, God's beloved! **This community is God's gift to us that exposes the lie** that we have to try harder. God has done everything needed for us already. Trying harder does not add to God's gift and in fact often distracts us from what God is doing in our lives. This life of freedom is ours for the taking, one day at a time walking with those God has given us to walk with on this road.

We gather **every Sunday**, of course where we will explore what God is doing in our world today (that's GRACE) and **every Thursday for 6 weeks** beginning March 14th through April 18th for DINNER CHURCH, reclaiming the early church model of joining together around a shared meal where everything we do is liturgy (the work of the people). You're invited to arrive between 5:30 and 6:00. We'll prepare a simple meal together, pray, sing, eat and deepen relationships in all of that. At 7:30 we'll be invited to move into the sanctuary for a brief but beautiful Holden Evening Prayer.

I hope you can open your heart to this gift that will bless not only you but those who receive the gift you offer: your self!

FAQ:

When does Lent begin?

Ash Wednesday, March 6th is the beginning of Lent. We'll have a noon service and one at 7pm where the Lord's Supper and ashes will be offered (to help us remember that while time is a gift it is not an unlimited

gift.) This is not a depressing service. It is an invitation and a nudge into the counter cultural season of Lent.

Will there be child care?

There will be supervised activities in the Sunday School room. Children are encourage to participate in **all of DINNER CHURCH** but while big people have discussion time, you might like them to have this option.

Where can I get the book we're reading, A Way Other Than Our Own?

In the parish hall on the table by the west windows. Or you can get the Kindle version.

Do I have to read the whole book?

No, just read one section $-1 \frac{1}{2}$ to 2 pages each day until Easter. :)

Should I bring some food to DINNER CHURCH?

Not unless you want to. If you want to bring whatever simple thing you'd like to share. Could be lettuce or carrots or cookies or whatever. We'll make some basics each week that can be supplemented with whatever shows up.

Does DINNER CHURCH cost anything?

No, we'll collect an offering each Thursday for a cause that is close to our heart, such as Family Promise or the Food Bank. The offering can be money or canned goods or items that Family Promise needs.

What if I'm late?

Come when you can. Stay as long as you want to.

What if I'm early?

You can join in whenever you get here.

Can I bring a friend?

Please do! There is truly no one who is unwelcome!



Dear Friends in Christ,

I have said it to myself, and I have heard it said from many other people lately, "Lent and Easter are so late this year! What's going on?!"

Often Ash Wednesday, the beginning of Lent, arrives by mid-February. This year Ash Wednesday doesn't come until March 6. Three years ago, we celebrated Easter on March 27. This year Easter will be on April 21. Why is it so early some years and so late this year?

Most Christian festival days are fixed on specific dates, so we know exactly when they are going to happen each year. Christmas is on December 25. Reformation Day is on October 31. There's no guessing and no surprises (at least not about the date.) Easter, however, changes from year to year. This is because the Christian church, from its earliest years, decided to set the date of Easter according to a lunar calendar, which measures time by the movement of the moon rather than the sun.

When the four Gospels tell us the story of Good Friday and Easter, they describe how Easter happened right after the Jewish festival of Passover. The Christian church decided to continue the calendar relationship between Passover and Easter. However, the traditional Jewish calendar is a lunar calendar and, therefore, the dates of Passover and Easter vary each year according to the phases of the moon.

The rule for setting the date of Easter is this: Easter is the first Sunday after the first full moon after the vernal equinox (the first day of Spring.) The vernal equinox, according to astronomers, actually slides between March 20 and March 22. However, in the traditional Christian church calendar, March 21 was picked as the yearly date of the vernal equinox. Therefore, Easter is always the first Sunday after the first full moon after March 21.

Why is Easter so Late this Year?

That means that March 22 is the absolute earliest possible date for Easter in any year. The latest possible date is April 25. So, our date of Easter this year, April 21, is quite late in this range of possibilities. (It will fall on the very latest date possible, April 25, in 2038.)

Those are all calendar-keeping facts that I find interesting, but are there any spiritual truths that might come to us out of this? As I find myself meditating on our late-blooming, off-in-the-distance Easter this year, here are a few thoughts that come to mind.

- ❖ God's gift of Easter (new life!) sometimes comes suddenly and sometimes must develop slowly in the hidden corners of our lives.
- ❖ Being forced to wait for a crucial event can help us to receive and open ourselves to it all the more.
- ❖ The full, springtime bloom that will be around us by April 21, will also be a sign of the life that God will help to "flower" in us through Easter.
- No matter where Easter is on the calendar, it will still surprise and disrupt our normal schedule!
- Easter is God's lunar gift to us lunatic people!
- ❖ Thank goodness that, whether early or late, Easter's resurrection power can never be stopped.

We are racing ahead of ourselves, of course. We are still in the light-filled days of Epiphany. Lent is a number of weeks off. Yet we are given strength for this journeying by trusting that we are headed toward the Easter moment when our lives and our world are turned upside down.


