Worship at Home

We in the ELCA believe that the sacrament of Holy Communion is a means of grace that "creates and strengthens faith for our daily work and ministry in the world," a rite that "draws us to long for the day of God's justice" and "provides sure and certain hope of the coming resurrection and eternal life" (from the ELCA's Use of the Means of Grace). At a time when physical contact is so limited, communing together virtually with our faith communities can affirm the reality that our bodies are engaged in worship even when we're participating from our living room, that we're still connected to the other bodies gathered virtually for worship even when we can only see photos of them online, and that Christ comes to us in the gifts of bread and wine even when our pastors' Words of Institution are mediated by a screen.

Food can remind us of who we are as a church community and can be symbolic of God's story. This Holy Week you might consider cooking a few things that remind us of the story of this week.

CELEBRATE WITH FOOD


Did you know that people used to pray with their arms crossed over their chest (kind of like the shape

of a pretzel)? To pray in this way is a posture of humility and reverence for God.

Make pretzel prayers for Good Friday as a family: 1. Buy a package of Pillsbury Bread Sticks or make your own.



- 2. Roll out the dough and then shape it into a pretzel shape.
- 3. Bake in oven according to directions. While the bread is baking, cross your arms over your chest like a pretzel and pray:



God, thank you for Jesus, who died for us. Thank you for Jesus, who loves us. Thank you for Jesus who forgives us. Amen.

- 4. Once done baking, brush with melted butter and add salt.
- 5. Eat your pretzels and watch the Maundy Thursday or Good Friday services on Facebook on the Amazing Grace website.

Easter Sunday, April 12

Prepare for Easter worship by baking communion bread together. One recipe is below, but any bread will work.

Worship on Facebook live at 10am will be a celebration so dress in your finest, join your church family in worship and perhaps join in the Easter "parade" driving the route of church families to see the rainbows there—symbols of the hope we have that God will bring good out of this difficult time.

Communion Bread Recipe

Sift dry ingredients together **three times**: (important!)

2 c whole wheat flour 1 c white flour 1 & 1/4 tsp baking powder 1 & 1/4 tsp salt

Stir in 4 tsp oil. Set aside.

Mix wet ingredients together until dissolved:

3/4 cup + 2 Tbsp very hot water (minimum of 180 degrees F)


3 Tbsp honey

3 Tbsp molasses

Add wet ingredients to dry ingredients and mix well. Dough should be slightly sticky. Do not knead. Divide into four balls and flatten each into a 1/4 inch thick disk.

With a knife, score the top of each loaf into eight pie -shaped sections, so that the sections can be more

easily broken off while serving. Alternatively, you could score a cross onto the loaf.



Lay the loaves on a baking sheet. Bake at 350 degrees for 10 minutes. Remove from oven and brush the tops of the loaves with oil. Bake an additional 5-8 minutes. Let cool.

Yield: four 8 oz. loaves. Each loaf serves 60-70 people, depending upon the size of the piece given. The loaves freeze well.

RESPONSE TO COVID-19 from ELCA presiding bishop

Dear church,

The last couple of weeks have been trying ones for everyone across this church. Our synods, congregations and ministries are facing challenges that they've never faced before. Being church together means more now than ever before.

The churchwide office is launching a comprehensive Covid-19 response across the ELCA beginning today. We have three new approaches designed to provide several levels of support for our most vulnerable congregations and ministries. These three approaches are Daily Bread Grants, Here to Serve, and the Covid-19 Response Appeal.

DAILY BREAD GRANTS

ELCA World Hunger is announcing the immediate launch of Daily Bread Matching Grants. Through these grants, ELCA congregations can raise funds for their feeding ministries using an online fundraising platform and will receive a grant of \$500 from ELCA World Hunger. Up to 100 Daily Bread Matching Grants are available for ELCA congregations on a first-come, first-served basis, with the possibility of more grants becoming available in the future. Apply or donate here.

HERE TO SERVE

The churchwide organization is inherently a resource in support of the members, congregations, synods and partners of the ELCA. During this time, Domestic Mission will pivot to a project-based, ser

vice-oriented structure so this church knows we are here to serve. By the first week of April, we will launch a chat function on ELCA.org along with an 800 hotline for prayer, support and questions that will be answered by our staff. As soon as these channels are live, we will let you know.

COVID-19 RESPONSE APPEAL

It's more important now than ever to support our church across the country through these difficult times. We will begin to raise funds to support our congregations, ministries and synods. This effort will launch the week of March 30 via email and social media with a special form online to donate.

In addition to our new three-pronged response, our work continues in providing and updating resources on <u>ELCA.org/publichealth</u>. We are also still at work in the world. Our global mission work continues and grows in this time of the Covid-19 pandemic. We are working with our global companions to provide support where we can. Learn more about that <u>here</u>.

I am proud to say that even during challenging times, we continue our service in living out the mis-

sion of this church: Together in Jesus Christ we are freed by grace to live faithfully, witness boldly and serve joyfully.

WE ARE ENTRUSTED WITH THE MINISTRY OF PRAYER

Even as we practice social distancing as an act of love for our neighbors, our loved ones and our medical community, we remember that God has created a world in which we are happiest and healthiest when we are caring for others. In light of that we pray, perhaps the most profound action we can take, for the sake of the world.

This letter from Nobel Peace Laureate Ellen Johnson Sirleaf (President of Liberia from 2006 to 2018, including during the Ebola crisis) guides us in praying widely and deeply:

Dear fellow citizens of the world,

... It does not mean that we are on our own, every country for themselves. On the contrary, it is the sign of a communal response, that border closures make a difference. Her letter concludes:

I have full faith in the relentless spirit of the individual, a conviction that leaders emerge in times of crisis at every level of society, and that our religious and communal differences pale in comparison to our collective belief in the power of prayer, and our respective faith in God.

As we all hunker down in the next few weeks, I pray for the health and well-being of our global citizens, and I ask that everyone remember that our humanity now relies on the essential truth that a life well-lived is a life in the service to others.

[Note: you can hear her read part of this letter on https://www.bbc.co.uk/sounds/play/w172x1gdf07d89j from about 05:30 to 09.00. The unedited text (also on the BBC website) includes:]

Lord, all-seeing, always present, you call us to live in community.

In this year when the community of Oberammergau, **Germany** would have celebrated their decision to lock down to stop plague spreading, we give thanks for that understanding of community which is about keeping one another safe. We give thanks for visionaries such as the community of Eyam, **United Kingdom**, the Nobel peace prize winner, Ellen Johnson Sirleaf and the Governor of Ohio, Mike DeWine.

In our prayers we remember those from whom the eyes of the world have moved:

The people of **Yemen** starving as many air raids strike Sanaa this week,

The displaced and the dispossessed especially those in refugee camps. We give thanks for those refugees, in groups like Help from Refugees in **Switzerland**, who put their much-needed skills at the disposal of their new communities.

The rough sleepers with no safe space to obey the rules of lockdown in Lagos, **Nigeria**, and many cities worldwide.

The migrant workers, especially those in **India** where a lock-down was imposed at 4 hours notice, and **Nepalese** are stuck at the border.



The people who are more persecuted than ever because of the perception that no one will notice; especially the **Palestinian** community of Khirbet Ibziq in the northern Jordan Valley. Their existing community clinic and generator were demolished by the Israeli army and building supplies for an emergency field clinic destroyed or confiscated.

We pray for those who think no one will notice when they pilfer hospital supplies, buy up and hoard goods needed by carers, nurses, doctors, ambulance crews and others. We give thanks that those called to work in all these essential areas still work despite knowing they are unprotected and will probably be taken ill. Remind us that it is not enough to call them heroes but to do what we can to support them. We give thanks for donations of real equipment from film sets, as from the sets of "Casualty" and "Holby City" in England.

We pray for those who are harmed, such as those caught in the shelling in Tripoli, **Libya**, as warring factions seek to hide the lack of a ceasefire while the eyes of the world turn inward.

For farmers and growers, the world is not standing still, for researchers too. As crops are planted with no knowing if there will be hands to harvest we pray for the springtime and the harvest. As news breaks that a blood test is being developed to determine early signs of cancer we give thanks that people still go about the work despite fear, sadness, and anxiety.

Remind us that while the sound of silence, the sound of bird song, and the sound of the wind and the rain, beguile us in the newly revealed quiet; our environment is still not safe. Birds, wildlife, and plants need our continuing protection and care.

All things praise you, glorious Lord, great Creator, powerful Word, omnipresent Spirit, now at your throne, we humbly bow, lift our hearts in praise to you: so we praise you, Lord, anew.
